Editorial Snap Shots.

Although the Bull Moose party is making strenuous efforts to defeat the Republican party, public sentiment is rapidly changing in favor of the reelection of President Taft in all parts of the country.

Because the Democratic vote in Vermont last week showed an increase over previous election, the Democrats felt highly elated. This week their hopes have been rudely shaken, for Maine has gone back to the Republican column.

How people did howl two years ago because the Republicans held an assembly. It was characterized as awful and a terrible state of affairs, and those who took part in it were denounced as enemies of the common people. Now the Bull Moose party is holding conventions and fixing up slates in the same old corrupt style of running politics, but we don't hear anyone howling their heads off as they did two years ago. Not even Bro. Trombley.

The Democrats disfranchised the colored men in the South, and the Bull Moose party have disfranchised Republicans in Kansas and California. Notwithstanding the boast that we are a people with political freedom and liberty. This is where the new party is making a mistake in its policy to rule or ruin, for any fair minded person will admit the injustice of depriving Republicans in those states the right to vote for the Republican nominees in the presidential election.

W. J. Bryan praised President Taft last week, which was a great contrast to the abuse the Bull Moosers have been heaping upon him the past few months. The only thing Mr. Bryan objected to in Mr. Taft was that he did not think he trusted the people. That is a matter of opinion. The people trusted Mr. Taft at the last presidential election, and he made good his promises to the people, giving the country four years of unprecedented prosperity. The proof of the pudding is in the eating.

What's chewing on some of our great estate agents, anyway, that they want a change of administration? Are the values in farm property and other real estate too high for them? We have always been under the impression that it was Republican prosperity which materially assisted in more than doubling the values in farm and timber lands in Tillamook County. Probably they think that dairy farms would change hands more readily if some of the values were knocked out of them. See the point?

It is the privilege of every citizen to belong to any political party, but we cannot understand how one can affiliate with the Bull Moose party, which is organized for the express purpose of defeating and putting out of business the G. O. P., and then claim to be a Republican or a Democrat. Perhaps the snap shot man is a little dull in comprehending how a person can claim to be a Republican or a Democrat and at the same time do everything to defeat the old parties. Consistency is a jewel, but how inconsistent some people are. We don't care whoop one way or another which party a person belongs to, but they shouldn't attempt

to carry water on both shoulders.

It is certainly surprising how anyone connected with the dairy industry in Tillamook county should want a change of administration. The dairymen of this county must admit that they have prospered during Taft's administration, and have never done better, but as the political bosses have been endeavoring to discredit the Republican party and calling for a new deal, there is a certain amount of political unrest which will have a disastrous effect before a great while. There was the same political unrest previous to and which elected Cleveland, but instead of the political agitation and change of administration bringing about better conditions it brought about industrial and financial stagnation. It is not necessary for us to dwell on the hard times and the empty dinner bucket that followed the political unrest, other than to say that it acted as a boomerang and the people had to suffer. Taft has given the people four years of unprecedented prosperity, as the dairymen of this county must admit. Why, then, take any chances of bringing on another slump in prices?

From all accounts it seems that the Willamette Valley had more rain this summer than Tillamook County. But it had a different effect on the crops. Here it produced a bumper hay crop and an enormous amount of green pasture, in fact, the grass grew faster than the dairy herds could chew it up. The result is that but little hay was damaged and Tillamook County will have the biggest output of cheese this year, going away above any previous year. On the other hand the Willamette Valley and other parts of Oregon will suffer on account of the rain damaging and destroying crops. Tillamook County keeps up its reputation for not having experienced any crop failures in the history of the county. This is another proof that Tillamook is one of the best counties in Oregon, even when the weather is freakish and cannot be depended upon, for a sure and profitable crop, and a money maker for those engaged in dairying. This is one of the best kind of advertising for the county, and the live wire boosters should not allow these facts to slip their memory when they boost for the county. But let Tillamookers be thankful that they live in such a splendid country.

The snap shot man was surprised at a little incident that took place at the meeting to form a County Development League on Tuesday evening. During the discussion as to what the dues should be, Mr. Cottle, one of the Bay City delegates, made this remark: "The members of the Bay City Commercial Club cannot afford to pay much because the club is swamped with bills." Whether it was intended or not, it was out of place to refer to trivial matters like that and give the club a black eye at a boosters' meeting, even had it been the truth. Even if the Bay City club had been swamped with bills that is a matter which concerns the members and should not be peddled around at meetings in other towns. During the few years the Tillamook club has been organized several times it has been swamped with bills because it is a live, progressive club. Yet none of the members hiked off to Bay City and aired these financial troubles. Not much. A few members got together and either went down in their jeans or provided the money in some other way. There was, however, no truth in Mr. Cottle's statement, for Mr. Proctor, defended the Bay City club and emphatically denied that it was swamped with bills, and in proof of this he said the club had money in the treasury.

The effort to form a County Development League is a commendable undertaking if it can be effected on the broad lines outlined by the committee appointed to submit a plan. The committee is certainly deserving of considerable credit for the time they have spent in devising a plan to bring together the commercial clubs, granges, co-operative cheese factories, etc., into one league. There are those who think that this can be easily done, while others contend that it is going to be somewhat difficult. To our

way of thinking, there is going to be a little uphill work in the start, for it will be "Show me" with the dairymen and dairy associations before they will take an active interest in a county development league, and for that reason we think the burden of making a success of it will fall entirely on the members of the different commercial clubs. It is a matter of education to get the different organizations together, and pulling together, for one common purpose, as well as considerable time before it will be consummated. No one doubts for a moment that a strong county organizations would be a splendid thing, but we want to impress this forcibly upon those who are boosting for a county league that it will be necessary to employ a live manager if it is to be successful. This may be a little premature at this time. What the committee is now desirous of knowing does the dairy interests and grangers want to affiliate with a county development league. To ascertain this the committee has called a meeting in this city for the first Wednesday in next month, at 10.30 a m.

Parcels Post in January.

In response to many inquiries for information, Senator Jonathan Bourne, Jr., Chairman of the Senate Committee on Post Offices and Post Roads, has prepared the following summary of the provisions of the new Parcel Post Law which will become effective January 1, 1913.

Any article is mailable if not over 11 pounds in weight nor more than 72 inches in length and girth combined, nor likely to injure the mails or postal equipment or employees.

Flat rate of 1 cent per ounce up to 4 ounces regardless of distance.

Above 4 ounces, rates are by the pound or fraction thereof, and varying with distance as follows:

The Postmaster General may make provision for indemnity, insurance, and collection on delivery, with additional charges for such service, and may, with the consent of the Interstate Commerce Commission after investigation, modify rates, weights, and zone distances, when experience has demonstrated the need therefor.

Presidents and Vetoes.

Mr. Bryan, in criticising Mr. Taft's vetoes, attempts leaving an impression that Mr. Taft has made freer use of the veto than any of his predecessors in office. It is impossible to maintain silence in the face of such a disingenuous attempt, even though criticism of a dead man's record must be involved in the answer. After all, it is history, more than men, we are called to discuss in such a case. And nobody knows better than Mr. Bryan that the high veto record among our presidents falls to the only one elected by the Democratic party in more than half a century.

While Mr. Cleveland was living it was possible to speak with freedom of the nature and character of most of his vetoes. They contributed largely to his defeat in 1888, alienating thousands of Northern Democrats who had been loyalists during the civil war. It would be ungenerous now to criticise them further, but it is right and proper, when the record of a Republican president is challenged by a Democrat in this pointed way, to recall the fact that Mr. Cleveland's vetoes were as the sands of the seashore for multitude as compared with the few Taft vetoes. And Mr. Bryan's contention that the veto power of the president should never be exercised save in vital matters, also is at variance with the record of Mr. Cleveland, whose vetoes covered a wide range of small matters, and were not infrequently couched in small terms.

The Meat Supply.

It is rather strange that we should now be figuring upon the raising of reindeer in Alaska as a source of meat supply, and as a means of reducing the high cost of living. Before the first opening of Oklahoma, when the dispossession of the cattle barons began, the plea of the barons that they were keeping down the price of meat was met with the assertion that the multiplication of farmers would raise up many small stock raisers to supply the market, and that if the supply of meat should ever fall far enough behind population to force increased priced farmers in all parts of the country would make stock raising on a small scale, a side line to their agricultural industry.

We have now for a few years been facing the condition which the cattle barons predicted, but the small stock raiser is not yet abundantly in evidence. He will undoubtedly appear in the evolution of things, but just now he is being anxiously awaited by millions of town and city dwellers who find themselves out of meat, and can not, like the country boy in the old story, dig for the grounding. In the meantime, an experiment in reindeer farming has been undertaken and is now flourishing.
