COUNTY OFFICIALS RETURN.

Find Great Interest Taken in the Columbia Highway.

The Tillamook County Court returned on Tuesday from their trip to Clatsop County with the county officials of that county. They spent considerable time in going over the road improvements in Clatsop County, and Judge Mason says they are doing some good work and doing it economically. They visited the convict camp and were well satisfied that Clatsop county was saving money by the employment of convict labor. What surprised the Tillamook County officials most was the great interest and enthusiasm taken in the Columbia Highway and the desire of those interested in it to have Tillamook County connected with it. What these boosters want is the Necarney road connected with the Columbia Highway. The Tillamook County Court made a thorough inspection of this road on their way out, and on their return came in by the Necanicum road. Some years ago it was agreed between the two counties that if Clatsop County would build the inner road that Tillamook County would finish the Necarney road. Tillamook County has the inner road built to the County line and graveled, while Clatsop county has ten miles to build. This would be the commercial road and would benefit a good many settlers in Clatsop county. On the Necarney mountain road Clatsop County has finished its part of the road, while Tillamook county has not completed its portion.

The Tillamook County official made no promises when this road would be completed, but will take it into consideration later, and it is probable that if Clatsop County will agree to build their part of the inner road, that this county will complete the Necarney mountain road, appropriating a certain amount for the next two years so as to have it finished when the Columbia Highway is finished. In looking over some of the roads in Clatsop County they found quite a number of narrow roads, the Tillamook County officials contending that it is more economical to build the wide road as is prevalent in this county to narrow ones. The local officials obtained some valuable information as to contract work, etc., and as Clatsop county officials have put their road work on a business and scientific basis, they are now obtaining results which will prove a great benefit to that county, for it is safe to say that after County Judge Judd and Commissioners Frye and Moore had seen some of the good roads in Tillamook county, they will endeavor to make Clatsop County roads as good as ours. When the two roads in the North end of the county are complete, connecting the two counties, it will be a splendid improvement, both from a commercial point of view and for the enormous amount of auto travel it will bring over the Columbia Highway.

ANSWER IN PORT OF BAY CITY CASE.

Attorneys Deny Allegations and Contend that Port and Commissioners are a Legal Corporation.

Dolph, Mallory, Simon & Gearin, of Portland, attorneys for the Port of Bay City, have filed an answer in the case of Geo. Watt against the Port of Bay City, which is a friendly suit to settle the legality of that Port. The substance of the answer to the complaint will be found below:

Deny that the defendant Port of Bay City is a pretended quasi municipal corporation, and allege in relation thereto that said defendant Port of Bay City is a duly constituted and organized corporation, organized under the provisions of Chapter 39 of the Laws of Oregon of the year 1909, and amended by Chapter 115 of the laws of Oregon for the year 1911. And the defendants deny that it has any legal existence for the reasons set out in plaintiff's complaint, or for any reason.

And defendants admit as alleged that in paragraph 1 of plaintiff's complaint, that defendants John O. Bozorth, Theodore Jacoby, Gust Nelson, W. C. Hawk and C. W. Pike claim to be and are acting as commissioners of the Port of Bay City, and allege that said defendants are the duly appointed, elected and qualified commissioners of said Port of Bay City, and are entitled to exercise the authority granted to Ports under the laws of Oregon. These defendants deny that they are or either of them is, usurping or entering into or unlawfully exercising a public office in the State of Oregon or the franchises of any franchise within the State of Oregon or the office of the offices of the Port of Bay City, organized or attempted to be organized as set out in plaintiff's complaint, except that the defendant, the Port of Bay City, is a duly organized corporation as above set out, and the said other defendants are the duly appointed, elected and qualified commissioners, and the said Port and the said Commissioners are exercising the authority granted under the laws of the State of Oregon to Ports duly organized in accordance with the laws of the said state.

Defendants admit that the relator is a resident within the limits of the territory described and is the

owner of real and personal property therein and is a taxpayer within said territory.

For answer to the allegations contained in paragraphs 2, 3 and 4 of plaintiff's complaint, these defendants admit these allegations, except where the authority of the defendants or the right of the other defendants as Commissioners is designated as "pretended" or "without authority" and as to such allegations these defendants deny the same and allege that in pursuance of Chapter 39 of the laws of Oregon for the year 1909, as amended by Chapter 115 of the general laws of Oregon for the year 1911, the Port of Bay City was duly incorporated and its boundaries duly and legally extended, and the said defendants are the duly appointed and elected commissioners of the Port, and that in all things the organization of said Port has been and is legal, and the said Commissioners are the duly appointed, elected and qualified and acting Commissioners of the Port of Bay City.

Defendants further answering said complaint deny each and every allegation contained in paragraph 5.

And for a further and separate answer and defense herein, these defendants say the Port of Bay City is a duly incorporated municipal corporation and the defendants duly qualified Commissioners.
