The case of Abe Mapea for the same charge was dismissed also. Two cases against Jas. Wilson were brought up Monday and dismissed for want of sufficient evidence to convict.

A meeting of all the Directors of the factories in the Tillamook County Creamery Association, as well as the factories not in the association and those privately owned, is called to meet at the Tillamook Commercial Club rooms on Saturday, October 5th, at one o'clock for the purpose of discussing the proposition of having a scoring contest between all the factories in Tillamook County, offering several prizes for the best cheese, and taking up matters of general interest to the factories. Everyone interested in manufacturing cheese in Tillamook County is urgently requested to attend.

Oregon Fisheries Co., a corporation, and Ole J. Drommes, vs. Elmore Packing Co., a corporation, and Grant Marshall, is a suit filed in the Circuit Court where the plaintiffs claim that on September 4th, at six o'clock in the morning, the defendant did intentionally, willfully, maliciously and negligently operate a motor boat in such a manner as to run into and strike admidships the boat owned by the Oregon Fisheries Co., and operated by Ole J. Drommes, doing, it is claimed, \$200.00 damages. To compensate the plaintiffs for this damage, they now sue for treble the amount of the damages set out in the complaint.

Captain Paul Schrader will relinquish command of the steamer Sue H. Elmore the end of the week and Captain Anderson will take his place as skipper of that vessel. Captain Schrader has been running to Tillamook for about 25 years, and he has a fine record, for all the time he has been running to Tillamook he has met with no accidents nor lost any freight on that account, which is a record any captain should be proud of, considering weather and bar conditions that often prevail here during the winter storms. Captain Schrader will remain ashore during the winter, and after so many years in command of coasting vessels, he is going to take a well earned vacation, but how he will like becoming a "land lubber" remains to be seen.

The famous Elmore dairy ranch of 193 acres on Tillamook Bay was sold last week by John H. Hathaway to B. N. Sprout of Washington County. The purchase also includes 60 head of high grade Holstein and Jersey cows. The deal was negotiated by Paul A. McPherson of Portland. Mr. Hathaway takes in exchange the 33 acre "El Dorado" apple ranch of Mr. Sprout, at Aloha, Washington county. Mr. Hathaway valued the Elmore ranch at \$50,000, and Mr. Sprout the apple farm at \$20,000, and it was on this basis that a trade was made, the former receiving some cash in part payment of the balance. Mr. Hathaway will remain in Tillamook, having rented the Washington County farm to I. C. Rowe, who has a place north of this city.

Attorneys H. T. Botts and Webster Holmes were in McMinnville Monday to argue a contempt of court case in a fishing dispute which Judge Galloway had set for that day, but the judge had forgotten that he had done so and had gone to Albany to try a case. Now the Tillamook attorneys are in a tight place to know whether to charge the trip up to profits and losses, to have the judge up and commit him to jail for contempt of court, or to sue the judge for their expenses. The following prices will be paid for butter fat next week at several of the co-operative factories, viz.: Maple Leaf Creamery, 39.6 cents; The Tillamook Creamery, 40.4 cents; Fairview Dairy Ass'n., 38 cents; Three Rivers Creamery, 39 cents; South Prairie Creamery, 38.3 cents; Clover Leaf Creamery, 38 1/2 cents; Long Prairie Creamery 36 cents; Elwood Creamery, 38 cents; Cold Springs Cheese Factory, 37 cents; Central Co-op, 35.3 cents, and East Beaver, 35 cents.

Owing to the delay account bad weather, cheese was late in reaching market and so returns were not in time to send checks out by the first of the month as usual.

\$10,000 DAMAGE SUIT.

For Alienating the Affections of a Married Woman.

Isaac E. Smith vs. Dan Hickey is a suit filed in the Circuit Court in which the plaintiff claims \$10,000.00 for alienating his wife's affections.

Plaintiff sets out that he was married to Sarah E. Northrup the 14th November, 1890, and that they lived together happily until April 12, 1911. Five children were born of this union. That during the summer of 1911 and from and after the 12th April, the plaintiff and his wife resided upon a farm belonging to the defendant, thus bringing to the plaintiff's wife and family in close proximity to the defendant, who lived alone in another house on the premises. Soon after the plaintiff moved there, the defendant wrongfully and wickedly contrived and intended to deprive the plaintiff of his wife's affections, society, companionship and assistance, began showing special attention to the plaintiff's wife and continued such special attentions until the separation of the plaintiff, and his wife, taking advantage of the plaintiff's every absence from the home, to ingratiate himself into the good

graces of the plaintiff's wife, and that by various and sundry seductive arts, promises and persuasions, the defendant succeeded in alienating the plaintiff's wife's affections entirely from him, and won the same to himself. That by said promises and persuasions of the defendant he finally succeeded in inducing the plaintiff's wife to desert and abandon the plaintiff and his home on the 24th August, 1911, and to apply for and finally obtain a decree of divorce from the plaintiff. That as a result of these acts of defendant, the plaintiff's wife was induced to and did permanently separate from him, thereby the plaintiff's home was broken up and he was rendered unable to keep the children together and was compelled to assent to the separation and the children to remain in the custody of his former wife. That immediately after the expiration of six months defendant and plaintiff's former wife were married and are now living together on the same farm, to the great humiliation and mental suffering of the plaintiff.
