At a meeting of the City Council on Monday evening, apart from allowing bills, the principal business was in accepting the engineer's estimate of cost in the construction of the sewer system and allowing a bill of \$17,000, which was \$2,000 less than the estimated cost.

There was a food attendance at the Equal Suffrage Meeting at the Court House on Monday evening, when Mrs. Jessie Manship and Mrs. Thomas Hawkes were the speakers. A club was organized with the following officers were elected: Mrs. A. Everson, President; Mrs. Thomas, vice-president, and R. W. Watson, secretary and treasurer.

A. F. Gardner, of Beaver, has a plan on foot which will give that place a fruit and vegetable canner. Already about \$700 has been subscribed. It is proposed to place it on a co-operative system basis, the same as the co-operative cheese factories and that Blaine and Beaver citizens will plant about eight acres to logan berries.

It is probable that a sidewalk will be constructed from Seventh Avenue West to the Trask river bridge about three quarters of a mile west of town. An effort has been made, and beyond a doubt will be successful, to secure the sidewalk that was formerly used in Maple Grove Addition, which sidewalk is being replaced by a concrete walk.

On Tuesday morning Dr. Reedy, while returning from an out of town call, lost control of his horse and was thrown out of his buggy. There being two occupants besides himself, he was holding a child in his lap, which made correct management of the lines impossible. Fortunately no one was hurt, and no great damage was done.

Trotting for salmon appears to be giving some of our citizens considerable sport, who have been quite successful in catching large fish. Dr. D. A. Sanburn caught a large chinook salmon which weighed 77 pounds and Mrs. Sanburn is making a record for successful trotting, having caught four large fish in one day, the largest weighing 65 pounds.

Rev. R. Y. Blalock brought the editor a box of fine apples that were grown on his place on the Nestucca. They are the Bismarck and goes to prove that the South part of Tillamook County can grow as fine apples as Hood River. As soon as the trees are pruned and sprayed the same as they are at Hood River, there would be no difference in the fruit.

The choir of the Presbyterian Church gave an enjoyable musical at the home of Mrs. Emmett Beles on Friday evening, when there was a good attendance, which consisted of music, singing and recitations, all of which reflected credit on the

performers. Those who took part were Mesdames C. W. Campbell, F. W. Christensen, Geo. Willett, D. A. MacKenzie, L. L. Baker and Misses Ruby McGhee and Edith Allger.

Since Prof. W. W. Wiley returned to his home in Eastern Oregon he had several hemorrhages and will go to Arizona on account of his health. Howard Drew has taken his place as superintendent of schools.

Congressman W. C. Hawley will arrive in this city tomorrow (Friday) morning for the purpose of meeting the citizens and his personal friends. Mr. Hawley was honored with a renomination at the primary election on account of the faithful service he has rendered the State of Oregon since he has been in Congress, and his re-election is assured. Mr. Hawley has many staunch friends in this county who are interested in his re-election.

When Commissioner Alley left for home Sunday morning he had not made up his mind whether he would allow his name to be used for re-election. Considerable pressure has been brought by Nehalem people and the Nehalem Commercial Club on Mr. Alley and it was reported in this city this morning that he consented to run. We also understand that N. J. Myers will run for sheriff on the Democratic ticket in opposition to Sheriff Crenshaw, which is done to keep up the Democratic organization.

Jacob Blum was in from Carnahan on Saturday. He is a booster for the re-election of Taft, and the reason that he is so enthusiastic for the president is on account of the prosperous times we have enjoyed, and he, in common with a large number in Tillamook County, are content to let well enough alone and not take any chances of a slump in business. Although there is quite a large socialist vote in Carnahan precinct, Mr. Blum feels quite positive that between Taft and Roosevelt, the president will have a large majority of votes in his precinct.

A divorce suit was filed in the Circuit Court by Mrs. Cynthia F. Johnson against her husband, Andrew Johnson. These parties were married in the City of San Jose, Cal., on the 10th October, 1893. They were residing at Wheeler, Ore., for 12 months previous to 7th January, 1911, when the defendant disregarding the solemnity of his marriage vow, wilfully and without cause deserted and abandoned the plaintiff. There are three children, 17, 14 and 7 years of age respectively, all minors and residing with and supported by the plaintiff, who asks the court for the custody of them.

Charles Pye, a former resident and county assessor of Tillamook County, paid his old friend, W. H. Hoskins, a brief visit last week, and was surprised to find so many improvements in this city and county, especially in his old stomping grounds at Nehalem. It was 34 years ago when Pye and Hoskins started into Tillamook, and while at North Yamhill they met J. W. Jennings and Joseph Lampitt on their way in, and strange as it may seem, they were all Englishmen, and settled here and married daughters of our old settlers. Pye married a Davidson, Jennings married a Elliott, Hoskins married a Vaughn, and Lampitt married a Baxter. Mr. Pye sold his ranch at Nehalem some few years ago for \$3,300, which is today worth \$20,000. He was one of the big fighters in the factional strife which prevailed at Nehalem for so many years, which, happily, came to an end when Mr. Pye and Mr. Newell moved away from that community, and with the burial of the hatchet the Nehalem country prospered and developed as it never did while the personal strife was in force and the entire community lined up on one side or the other.

Joe Harrison was in the city on Monday and called on the editor and informed him that he did not want any more Republican literature sent him, as he belonged to the Bull Moose party. Mr. Harrison was instrumental in obtaining the nomination on the Republican ticket for Mr. Edner, as county commissioner, and, of course, is now interested in his election. The names of Mr. Edner and President Taft are both on the Republican ticket, but Mr. Harrison is going to support the former and "knite" the latter. The matter of prizes was taken up and George Williams, F. W. Christensen and Carl Haberlach were appointed to make all arrangements as to time, prizes to be offered, dates, etc.

The following amounts were pledged, Chas. Ray, Tillamook Creamery, Maple Leaf Creamery, Fairview, Tillamook Co. Cry Assn., R. Zweifel, East Beaver, South Prairie and Clover Leaf, \$10.00 each; Long Prairie, Elwood and Pleasant Valley, each \$5.00. Total, \$105.00. When all amounts are received it is expected that about \$150.00 will be received. Factories not present are to be asked to contribute and it is expected that the contest will bring out a fine display of cheese.
