DEMOCRATIC POW WOW.

Predict That Wilson Will Be Elected President.

The Democrats held a meeting on Wednesday evening at the Court House, when State Senator M. A. Miller, of Lebanon, was the speaker of the evening. J. K. Weatherford, of Albany, was also billed to speak, but he failed to make the trip. There was a large attendance, including some of the old time stand pat Democrats, like Attorney C. W. Talmage and S. S. Johnson, P. W. Todd, J. S. Lamar, S. A. Brodhead, Thos. Coates, Editor C. E. Trombley and others, numbering in all about 25. The rest of the audience was made up of a few leading lights in the Bull Moose Democratic Aid Society and a few regular Republicanists.

Attorney C. W. Talmage presided and introduced the speaker. Mr. Miller devoted most of his time discussing the tariff policy of the Republican party and the trust question, and attempted to show how the large trust companies had become immensely wealthy at the expense of the working classes, stating that men were working for small wages in some of the trust companies shops and factories. He was in favor of reducing the tariff, and he criticized President Wilson, and he criticized Governor Wilson, and he criticized the bill which was passed to lower the tariff on certain articles. Mr. Miller, in closing, predicted that, on account of the split in the Republican party, Governor Wilson would be the next president, which brought forth applause from the Democrats.

Announcement.
