G. O. P. MEETINGS.

Addresses Made by Senator Haines and Judge Hollis.

The Republicans had a rally on Saturday under the auspices of the Tillamook County Taft Club, when two meetings were held at the Court House, which were addressed by Senator Haines, of Forest Grove, and Judge Hollis of Hillsboro. There was a good attendance at the afternoon meeting, including a number of dairymen who have become interested in the Republican Campaign. Captain W. D. Stillwell, president of the Club, called the afternoon meeting to order, when the principal speaker was Senator Haines. He discussed the political issues from a business man's point of view, but in doing so read a number of extracts from speeches made by Roosevelt, Bryan, Wilson and others lauding President Taft for the manner in which he was conducting national affairs, but no sooner had rich politicians like Pinchot and Garfield poisoned the ex-president's mind, when a campaign of abuse was made on President Taft. Mr. Haines contrasted the protective policy of the Republican party and the free trade policy of the Democratic party, and recited an instance which came under his observation during the Cleveland administration. He said he was in business at the time and was dealing with a well known jobbing house. He was shown over the immense stock of goods, all of which had been bought in foreign markets. This was only one firm of many which bought in foreign markets at that time, for had the jobbers bought American made goods they could not have sold them when placed in competition with goods manufactured in foreign countries. This not only had the effect of sending out an enormous amount of money out of the country, but the mills and the factories closed down and men were thrown out of employment. Mr. Haines asked his audience whether any company doing a good business would want to take chances of making a change in the policy and management of the company when everything was in a prosperous condition. He did not think so. It was the same with the government. To change its policy now, with the prospect of the tariff being reduced by the Democrats, would be liable to cause a tightening up. Mr. Haines made a strong appeal to Republican to stay with the party and vote for the re-election of President Taft. But if the party was beaten it would be better to go down to defeat with its colors flying than in voting for Roosevelt, for that was simply helping to elect Wilson, as the leaders in the Bull Moose party have about conceded that they have no prospect of winning.

Judge Hollis, who is a candidate for State Senator, gave a brief talk on the amendments to be voted upon.

Both gentlemen addressed the evening meeting, which was not so well attended as the afternoon meeting.

THE REGISTRATION.

Republicans Number 1,053-- Two to One Above All Others Put Together.

Registration closed on Saturday, with an increase of 394 over the registration of 1910. One of the most remarkable features about the registration, notwithstanding that it is claimed that many persons have left the Republican party and joined the third party, only seven citizens have registered as progressive:

It will be noticed that the Republican party in Tillamook County increased from 838 in 1910 to 1,052 in 1912 and the Democratic party increased from 179 to 236 in the same time. The Republicans have a majority of two to one in the county over all other parties.
