Melchoir and T. H. Goyné, three disinterested freeholders of Tillamook City, to view such proposed street and make an assessment of the damages and benefits on account of the laying out of the street mentioned in said Ordinance, and did appoint Monday the 25th day of November, 1912 at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m., at the Council Room in the Commercial Club Rooms, in Tillamook Block, Tillamook City, Oregon, as the time and place for said viewers to meet.
