**Demonstration Farm.**  
Details of the plan to establish a demonstration farm in this county were discussed at the meeting of the board of directors of the County Development League yesterday afternoon. It was decided that a tract of not less than 40 nor more than 80 acres should be rented, the land to be approximately half bottom and half prairie. Secretary Claussen was instructed to advertise in the newspapers in order to secure the proper place. President Kunze, Joe Durrer and Wm. Maxwell are to have the final selection of the places offered.

The secretary was also instructed to write to Dr. Withycombe, of the Oregon Experiment Station, to the Wisconsin Experiment Station and to Hoard's Dairyman to try to get in touch with the proper man to operate the farm. On the man more than anything else will depend the success of the undertaking, is the opinion of the directors. He should be thoroughly experienced and practical and must be able to demonstrate the value of his methods.  
No further action will be taken by the board until more definite information on these points has been secured.

**A Cow Conundrum.**  
"What is the difference between a Democratic cow and a Republican cow?"
