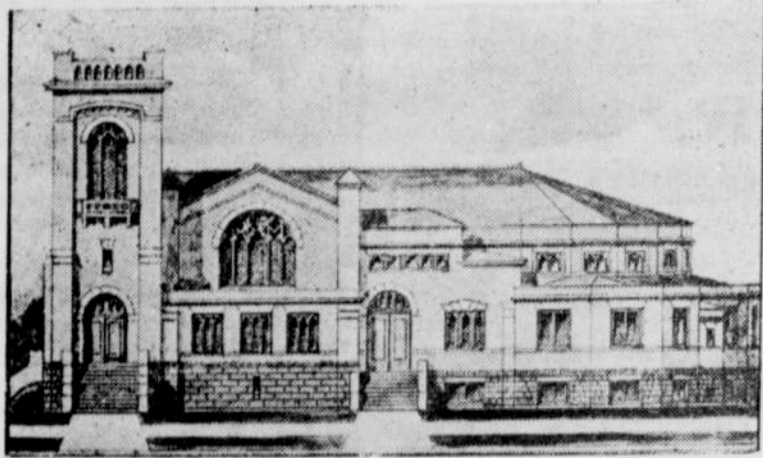

CORNER STONE OF CHRISTIAN CHURCH LAID.

In Delightful Weather and a Large Gathering Present.

The program for the laying of the corner-stone of the new Christian Church of this city was carried out as previously announced, with one exception, last Sunday afternoon. At this time of year when the inclemency of the weather so frequently interrupts the heat laid plains for "out of doors" services, we are especially grateful to the great head of the church for the beautiful sunshine which contributed so much to the pleasure and success of the corner-stone laying service last Sunday afternoon.

The service began promptly at 3 p. m. A large number of the members and adherents of the other churches of the city united with the members of the Christian church and citizens of Tillamook in witnessing the placing of the corner-stone. The concrete walls and floors of the basement of the church are completed, and the foundation of the tower on the northwest corner of the building, upon which was laid a temporary floor, furnished an elevated platform upon which the singers and speakers stood during the rendering of the different parts of the service. The platform was decorated with the national colors, and upon it rested the derrick which was used in placing the stone.

The choir of the Christian church opened the exercises with the singing of an appropriate hymn. Then followed the reading of a Psalm by Rev. I. E. Meese, pastor of the United Brethren church. The first address of the afternoon was made by Mr. D. L. Shrode, president of the Tillamook Commercial Club on "The Value of the Church to the Business Interests of the City." Mr. Shrode emphasized the self-evident truth that among the enterprises and occupations in which the citizens of this city are interested, only a church erection service, or some enterprise in sympathy with the ideals and work of the church could possibly succeed in drawing to a service of this kind so large a number of the leading citizens of this community. It is an unquestioned proof that the church is an invaluable asset in any community, and is so regarded by all morally educated people.

Owing to the fact that the Mayor, Mr. J. R. Harter, was suffering from a severe cold, he was unable to be present to speak on the subject assigned to him. The next speaker was the Rev. H. W. Kuhlman pastor of the Methodist church, who spoke strongly and entertainingly on the subject: "Our Final Aim." This is plainly the preacher's specialty Church buildings, however beautiful and comfortable, are only a means to an end, and that end is universally recognized to be the building up and development of Christian character. After a prayer

led by Rev. D. A. MacKenzie, pastor of the Presbyterian church, and a gospel song by the choir, the next speaker introduced was Rev. C. L. Swander, Field Missionary of the Christian Church. Mr. Swander's address was replete with good thoughts, and was delivered in a happy and effective manner. A verbatim report of his address would make excellent reading, but space forbids more than a commendatory notice.

Then followed the laying of the corner-stone, and the placing in a cavity in the stone a copper box containing the usual documents of historical interest. Mr. Smith Elliott and Mrs. F. A. Latimer, charter members of the church, assisted in this important part of the service.

After a few appropriate remarks by the pastor, Rev. J. F. Jope, the service was closed with the benediction.

Alley Makes Explanation.

(TO THE EDITOR TILLAMOOK HEADLIGHT.)

DEAR SIR,—I feel it my duty to reply to some of the unjust statements and criticisms as stated by the Bay City Examiner from time to time, charging me with not giving the roads around Garibaldi and tributary to Bay City their proportion of road improvement.

Last year special attention was given to the road leading up the Miami River some four miles being reconstructed, widening the narrow dangerous places and graveling the same at a cost of about \$8000.

The present year, although severely handicapped by the small amount of road money available, there being only \$18,000 to be expended in the whole north and district including Nehalem, the five or six miles of road lying between Bay City and the Life Saving Station received in the neighborhood of \$8000, including a new road through Garibaldi and affording an outlet to the Nehalem and Garibaldi beaches.

In addition to the above, a new steel bridge was also built across the Miami River on the same road to replace the old rotten wooden structure at a cost of over \$3000.

Having always advocated good roads, I was in favor of the above improvements, and my only regret is that I was unable to do more owing to the lack of funds.

In conclusion, I will say, it has been my expressed intention not to become a candidate at this election. It was only at the urgent request of people from various parts of the County and particularly those of the Nehalem Valley that I have consented to enter the race.

I bear no ill will to either of my opponents, Mr. Edner or Mr. Scovell, and in case one of them should be chosen, I will still continue to do all in my power to promote the cause of good roads.
