Robinson, who was for some time clerk in Lamar's Drug Store, was elected County Clerk of Polk County on the Democratic ticket by a plurality of 52 votes. Shrode, president of the Tillamook Commercial Club, made a few appropriate remarks. Owing to the trouble on the P. R. & N. Tuesday's mail did not reach this city until three o'clock next morning. There was no mail either way on Wednesday, but today (Thursday) it is expected that a transfer will be made, and the mail brought from Garibaldi on the Henrietta, on account of the slide this side of Hobsonville.
