Stock Running at Large. In a lengthy communication, a correspondent is wanting to know how many precincts there are where stock is not allowed to run at large and what action should be taken to prevent it. This is the gist of the communication, leaving out all personalities. Previous to the election, Tillamook, Hoquartion, Fairview, South Prairie, and Carnahan were in the prohibitive precincts, and at the election last week Beaver, Foley, Blaine and Little Nestucca were added, making 9 out of the 18 precincts where stock is not allowed to run at large. We do not know of any case where a person has been prosecuted for violating this law, although there is some complaint of persons violating it. Hogs are not allowed to run at large anywhere in the county. For the information of our correspondent and others, we will give the law so that they may be correctly informed how and in what manner they can enforce it if they have any grievance against those who will not comply with it. The law is as follows: If a majority of all the votes cast should be against stock running at large, the county clerk shall give notice by publication in some newspaper of general circulation in the county, and in the election precinct if the election for stock running at

Large affects any one precinct only, for three (3) consecutive weeks, that in sixty (60) days from the date of said notice it shall be unlawful for stock to run at large, under penalty of ten (10) dollars for each and every subsequent offense, to be recovered from the owner of the stock in a civil action in the name of the State of Oregon before a justice of the peace in the district in which such owner or keeper or either of them may reside, and if there be no justice of the peace in such district, then before any justice of the peace in the county, and it shall be the duty of each constable in any justice of the peace district, and of each road supervisor in any road district to enforce the provisions of this section; and such penalty shall be for the benefit of, and when collected, paid into the common school fund of the county in which such action is brought, within sixty (60) days after such animal is proved to be at large.
