**Editorial Snap Shots.**

In about another year, we expect to hear of another political cyclone in this city to "turn the racial out."

How strange it was that no one attempted to get into the progressive band wagon in the city election.

The city election conclusively proves that the people who are for law enforcement are now in the majority, which is a source of much pleasure to us.

The saloon keepers will now take a tumble to themselves, get out of the "department" system as quickly as possible, and put the lid on and keep it down on Sundays. Most everybody knows what's going to happen if they don't.

What's the trouble, anyway? It wasn't exactly a Democratic land slide on Monday, but what with the stampede of mules in the fifth ward and John riding his mule over the Bull Moose, this city is right up to date politically.

The mules beat the horses in the race in the fifth ward, with Jockey Dick manipulating the former and Jockey Maddux up on the latter. Webb is thinking of going back to Missouri and buying some mules before he accepts another mount in a political race.

One of the honor men at the state penitentiary was deprived of his honor privileges because he fell in love with a female attendant there. We don't think he did anything wrong, for falling in love is so natural and common amongst all classes of persons and there is no penalty prescribed for doing so.

Take your hat off to Honest John, Fred. The Mayor, addressing F. R. Beals after the votes had been counted, said, "Well, Fred, I beat you." But this is not the first time that the wide-awake, pioneer real estate hustler tasted defeat in a city election, and for that reason it don't feel so bad.

The wretched condition at the jumping off place of the P.R. & N. in this city should not be tolerated any longer and it is time that some action be taken to advise the Railroad Commission of the negligence of the railroad company. The citizens and the business men have been exceedingly patient, notwithstanding that the railroad has been in operation over twelve months and Tillamook City gives the P.R. & N. by far the largest amount of business on the road. Whichever department of the Southern Pacific have gone to sleep, it is time they were jacked up and made to get a move on.

We were greatly interested in some of our citizens who took a sudden interest in the city, but we will gamble that during the past year not one of them have appeared before the city council and suggested something which would improve the moral tone of the city. We have no patience with citizens who boil all over and make sweeping accusations a day or so before election and during the remainder of the year never hear a word from them. We believe any reasonable ordinance to better moral conditions would have gone through unanimously had

the citizen gone to the council with a proper showing.

Here is one little coincident which Mayor Harter had to contend with, because he closed down on what was believed to be a bawdy house, the parties turned in and fought him. We have seen several letters the past year addressed to Mayor Harter from women who wanted to run houses of prostitution and offered to pay the Mayor certain sums of money every month. He would not allow it and that is the reason the city has been kept clean in that respect. We ask in all fairness now many of our citizens who prate about moral conditions have thanked the mayor for putting his foot down on the white slave traffic in this city?

We want to differ with those who said the moral conditions are worse now than they ever were. We want to say that this is a falsehood and the persons who make them are injuring the reputation of the city. The snap shot man, although not wishing to resurrect old sores, remember the time when he fought, almost single handed, the "wide open" gambling and white slavery, and was called a fool for doing so. We want to say that the moral tone of the city is five hundred per cent better today than it was then, and conditions are becoming far better. One thing sure, if for some trivial and personal reasons, the moral element get fighting one another, as they did on Monday, that kind of a thing, somehow, don't look good to the snap shot man.

When some of our citizens stand before the judgment bar and the recording angel reads from the big white book the men things, falsehoods, etc., they have said and circulated about candidates in the city election we are wondering how they are going to square themselves and get round that passage in holy writ about no scandal mongers being allowed to enter the celestial city. How many citizens are there id is this city who have wilfully broken this divine precept in the recent city election? It is not for us to judge, but most everybody knows that the scandal mongers have a whole lot of sins recorded against them. This is a little sermonette preach for the purpose of pointing out where some of the Christian graces and the golden rule have been cast to the four winds and scandal and false statements substituted for them. If you feel guilty in this respect, dear Brother or Sister, then it is time you were down on your marrow bones pleading for forgiveness.

It was poor judgment when two gentlemen like Mayor J. R. Harter and Attorney H. T. Botts, who have been working together as mayor and city attorney, should be pitted against each other in a city election, for both rank with our best and most progressive citizens. Both are pronounced against saloons, in fact, Harter is the most radical in his views of the two and any rabid prohibitionist could vote for him without violating his platform. During the last few years the city have gone along peaceable and the business men have come together with a friendly spirit and work together for the best interest of the city, which we consider is the best system to correct whatever needs improving. And for that reason, whatever strife or ill feeling the election may have engendered, we ask that wherever mistakes were made and wrongs done to any of the candidates they will be forgiven and forgotten, all working together along practical and business lines for the up-building of the city.

How strange, yet how true! Two years ago some of our worthy citizens undertook to run city politics, who "worked" the church people of this city and elected one of our citizens mayor who was attorney for the liquor dealers and saloon keepers, under whose administration the "department" system of saloons came into effect. The same forces jumped in at the recent city election and endeavored to work the same people in behalf of a candidate for mayor who is on the water wagon. From an observer's view point, consistency don't count for anything in city politics. The snap shot man, having watched that condition of

affairs, is not surprised that the saloon keepers have taken advantage of these conditions. We simply mention this for the benefit of the women who cast their first ballot on Monday, for we have a vague impression that the same methods were used to get their votes for the "dry" candidates as were used two years ago to secure the church vote for the liquor dealers' attorney for mayor. From a politician's standpoint this is considered good politics, and it goes to prove that we are not behind the times for politicians who believe it is all fair in love, war and politics.

**The White Hope.**

Mobs are seeking novelties. Old-fashioned hanging bees are growing monotonous. Even the fiery stake is losing its charm through too frequent exhibition. It is not long since it was reported that a Georgia mob had tied a negro to a railroad track to be run over by a train. A Florida mob, on Thursday, took Preech Nellie, a negro, into an open space. He was told to run, and when he ran, more than a hundred men opened fire on him. The Ocala dispatch naively says: "He was shot to pieces."

This, however, was not new, any more than burning at the stake is new. Burning was done by the Indians when in the savage state, but in the burning of the negro at Purcell, Ok., the Chickasaw Indians, who are numerous thereabouts, refused to participate. A finer proof of the Indians' advancing civilization could not be offered than this evidence that he is now so far advanced that he refuses to revert, under strong temptation, to the barbarism of his forefathers. This leads not only to the hope, but to the confident belief, that the Indian would be equally strong to resist a temptation to revert to that form of barbarism, popular with his ancestors, of releasing a prisoner, with a command to run, and then filling his body with arrows. It is many years since Indians were guilty of such barbarities.

There would still be barbarities, as methods of execution, even after conviction of the most heinous crime. In the case of Preech Nellie, he had not been given so much as a preliminary examination. Charged with a double murder in the perpetration of an unspeakable crime, there can be no doubt that, even on nothing more than prima facie evidence, he would have been convicted and made to suffer the penalty of the Florida law, in that impressive way to inspire both respect and terror in the criminal-minded. But for the purpose of making a savage holiday, he was denied a trial, and made the victim of such inhumanity as always arouses hate, resentment and new crimes, instead of respect and dread. We trust that, in time, all of the whites of this country will be as well civilized as all of the Indians now are. No white man need despair of attaining civilization while he has the high example of the Indian before him.

**DEALS FOR TIMBER INVOLVE \$9,000,000.**

22,000 Acres in Washington and Tillamook Counties Bought for \$5,000,000.

With the determination of negotiations for the transfer of a large tract of timber land in Washington and Tillamook counties for approximately \$5,000,000 and two other timber deals in process of closing, Eastern capital involving a total of \$9,000,000 is being invested in Oregon as a direct result of the signal defeat of single tax at the election held last month.

In the deal closed yesterday the purchaser is the Wilson River Timber Company, incorporated in the State of Delaware, and composed of Portland and Eastern capitalists. The property acquired includes 22,000 acres and consists of a number of separate but contiguous tracts formerly held by P. L. Willis, W. F. Stine and J. O. Elrod, of Portland; by the Pacific Coast Timber Company, composed of Mr. Willis, Mr. Stine and the Sherman estate and by R. V. Jones and L. B. Menefee.

**Property on Rail Lines.**  
The property is on the main line of the proposed United Railways extension and about one mile north of the Portland Railway & Navigation line, completed last year by the Southern Pacific Company, between Hillsboro and Tillamook. It is about 40 miles from Portland on a direct line, and on the north fork of the Wilson River.

As the property is on the west slope of the Coast Range its natural outlet is through Tillamook Bay. However, it would be impracticable to ship it from that point with the Tillamook channel in its present condition, say those interested in the enterprise. As soon as the Tillamook harbor improvements now under way and projected are completed extensive logging and milling operations are likely to follow.

**Rail Extension Rumored.**  
Contingent upon the harbor improvements also is the extension of the United Railways to Tillamook and Bay City.

It is understood that the new owners of the timber tract have conferred with officials of the United Railways with reference to building the extension, but pending the harbor development definite steps for carrying on the railroad work will not be attempted.

J. J. Hill and other officials of the Hill system frequently have asserted that the Tillamook bay line will be completed as soon as the lumber market shows encouragement and the Tillamook harbor improvements are finished. The lumber situation, it is admitted, is satisfactory, and the implication is held out that harbor development alone is needed to make the rail extension certain.

It is probable that some of the timber will be cut and marketed even before the work at Tillamook is finished. In that event the logs will be brought to Portland and milled here. Construction of a connecting link from the Harriman line over the single mile separating it from the property is entirely feasible. This will be done if immediate development is desired.

**Land is Productive.**

A valuable consideration in this transaction is the fact that the land is of rich productive capabilities and will become excellent dairy and agricultural property after it is logged off. It is the intention of the owners to dispose of it for this purpose after they have cut the timber.

Final consummation of the deal, which had been pending for several months, was delayed on account of the single tax issue before the voters at the November election. When it became certain that single tax had been defeated the Eastern men interested in it agreed to invest.

It is asserted that every acre of the land is covered with Douglas fir of the highest quality, but the total number of feet of timber involved has not been determined.

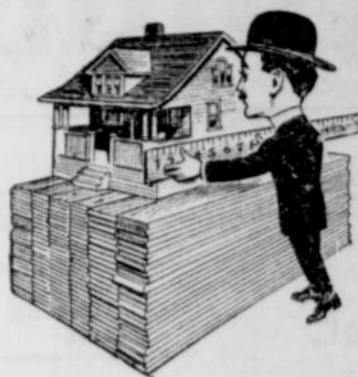
