

**HARTER WINS OUT**

**Big Turn Out of Women at the Polls.**

The city election this year was doubly interesting, for it was the first time that the women went to the polls and took an active part in a city election. This interest in a city election, which had been expected for they had taken a lively interest in the city caucus. There would not have been nearly as much interest taken in the election, but at the eleventh hour a secret caucus was held on Friday night and it was decided to run Attorney H. T. Botts, who is the city attorney and legal adviser of the mayor, to run against J. R. Harter. Both sides then became exceedingly active in endeavoring to get as many as possible lined up for their sides. From all appearances Mr. Botts had the support of a number of church people and the women were also active in trying to secure his election, while Mr. Harter was undoubtedly the voice of the business men on account of the large amount of time he had put in making Tillamook a progressive, up-to-date, city, and he was perfectly satisfied with the administration, although he had a strong contingent against him of citizens who were opposed for one reason and the other, to the street improvements. In true political fashion a great many untruthful reports were circulated about Mr. Harter, and the women were not slow in catching onto that political trick and also peddled them around, which probably injured him some in the race. There is not much difference between Harter and Botts in the temperance question, for of the two Harter holds the most radical views, but notwithstanding these facts, the temperance and the proportion of the church people were for Botts, which drove the opposite side over to Harter, not because they liked him, but because he had not made any radical moves. From a city's point of view it was a matter of much regret amongst some of our best citizens that these two men should have been induced to run against one another, for they are both highly respected and belongs to the class which have always been on the side of good government and the enforcement of law. Miss Myrtle Mills did not accept the nomination for city treasurer, which left that office without a nominee. In the fight for councilmen, F. L. Sappington was put up by petition in the first ward in opposition to E. D. Bag; John Kirchoff in the fourth ward in opposition to Erwin Harrison; and J. W. Maddux in the fifth ward against G. L. Dick. The first three votes polled were by women—Mrs. Amanda Edmunds, Mrs. Nancy Ginn and Mrs. Ellen Wiley. The election board was kept busy during the polling hours, not only with a few brief spells there as a string of voters all the time, there were so many votes cast in the fifth ward that all the official ballots were used up just before closing time and with a large number of voters in waiting to cast their ballots. This caused some delay and it was five o'clock before the last vote was cast, which was an hour past the time.

**DAIRYMEN MEET.**

**Large Attendance at the Court House on Monday.**

Previous to the meeting which was called Monday at the Court House, which was well filled with some of the leading dairymen, Chas. Kunze said that while he and others from this county were attending the State Dairymen's Association in Portland last year, an effort was made to have the association meet in Tillamook this year, but owing to the lack of accommodations and not having the necessary organization in the county the Association will hold its meeting at Albany this year. Mr. Kunze thought if the dairymen would join the State Association, which costs \$1.00 a year, an effort could be made to bring the association to Tillamook next year. About 18 of the dairymen joined the association, and it is expected that the number will be increased to 50. Mr. Kunze then introduced the speaker of the day.

Byron Hunter, who is in charge of farm management investigations of the department of Agriculture, having Idaho, Oregon and Washington as his territory. He said he was agreeably surprised to find such splendid dairying lands in Tillamook, and thought it was going some when told that four cows had been kept on four acres of land. Mr. Hunter said that he had not come to Tillamook to tell them how to dairy farm in this county. It would be presumption on his part to do so, for they know more about local conditions than he did. He then explained the work of his department and how the necessary information was obtained before giving out any suggestions. The system was to go into some farming section of the country and ascertain from the most successful farmers how they managed, and after obtaining this to give the information to other farmers who are not so successful. He illustrated this by saying that a farmer in the Willamette Valley was growing kahl. He had sent to England for the seed, but those in the neighborhood knew nothing of the value of kahl and were not growing it. He went to a number of the most progressive farmers and gave them the information and now most of them in that vicinity are growing it for cow feed. He also gave a similar illustration of turning hogs on stubble, which was not very largely done at that time in the wheat country, but by giving out that class for information others did the same and he showed by figures what profit it was to farmers who thought they had no feed for their hogs. He often went into a section of country where some farmers were doing well while others were not, and by giving the latter the useful information how to make a success, they generally all succeeded in doing so. He ventured the remark that he thought on the high priced land of this county it would be better to import feed, but as this had been tried without much success, he was not aware of this fact. In regard to an experimental farm and the cost of maintaining it would be necessary to raise half the cost, either through the Commercial Clubs or Granges, but the plan he liked best was for the County Court to appropriate the necessary money. In closing Mr. Hunter explained to the dairymen the value of the different bulletins sent out and how to obtain them. As far as offering any new suggestions Mr. Hunter was not in a position to give them about this county, for he had to study them out first.

**The Retiring Party's Compliments.**

In turning over the control of the affairs of the country to another party the Republicans have the pleasure of reporting everything in solvent shape, with prosperity at high tide in all the states and outlying possessions. Another item to which attention is called by an official statement sets forth the fact that the foreign trade of the United States for the year 1912 will pass the four-billion line for the first time. When the Dingley law was passed in 1897 it was said that the return to a protective policy would cripple our foreign trade and set the world against us to our heavy loss. What really happened was a great and general increase. Our foreign trade in 1897, the total of exports and imports, was \$1,810,000,000. It passed \$2,000,000,000 in 1899, \$3,000,000,000 in 1906, and will exceed \$4,000,000,000 in the present calendar year.

This advance would have been called progressiveness before the word fell into freakish disrepute. It is enough now to refer to it as solid progress. All has occurred under protective tariffs, one of which is still in force, though shortly to be sapped and mined by a minority of voters invested with complete authority by pluralities in a three-sided fight. A majority of voters supported protective platforms in the recent contest, but this majority must go into the background for the next two years. They hand over the reins of power with an excellent record, and what is even better, a good conscience. The Republican party does not consider the year 1912 a barren one for itself. In national convention assembled it rejected a third-term movement for the second time. It would rather stand by its principles and be defeated than go into any form of demagoguery for the sake of expediency. In two former years it was retired. But how quickly and gladly the people recalled it.

As ships tolls at Panama have been fixed at about the same ratio as those collected at Suez there can be no complaint that the United States is illiberal, or trying to exact all that the traffic will bear. The Suez Canal cost \$100,000,000, or only about one-fourth of the amount this country is spending on the Panama Canal. Though the latter is but half the length of the Suez waterway it is at least 200 feet wider at the bottom and has a depth of 41 feet, compared with 31 at Suez. The United States began work at Panama eight years ago and ships will pass through next year. De Lesseps started on a Red Sea canal in 1852, but the Suez route was not opened until 1869. In 1875 the British Government, whose position before that year had been one of protest, bought the khedive's shares for \$20,000,000, and the canal was enlarged. Net profits reached \$7,000,000 in 1890 and have greatly increased. The tonnage passing through has gained fourfold since 1880.
