Cheese Scoring Contest

Next Saturday the cheese scoring contest will take place in this city, which is held under the auspices of the Tillamook County Creamery Association, with Carl Haberlach, George Williams and F. W. Christensen, the Committee having arrangements in hand. In addition to the prizes offered last week, which included three loving cups, a fine clock and a silk hat, other prizes have been offered, viz: Monroe & Crisel, two suit cases valued at \$30 and \$6; Lamb-Schrader Co., 5 gallons electric roof coating and 1 barrel cement. The contest will take place in the rooms of the Tillamook Commercial Club at two o'clock in the afternoon. The scorer will be O. Friedli of the Portland Cheese Company. The committee would like to see as many dairymen present as possible and it is hoped that all Co-operative Associations and other makers will enter cheese in these contests, which will be held from time to time.

The meeting will be addressed by E. T. Judd, Chief Deputy Dairy and Food Commissioner of Portland, and some of the leading vocalists will help to entertain the audience.

Depot To Be Built.

We would have undertaken the grading before now, had it not been that all our forces were engaged in removing slides on the main line. We expect to get the grading started in a very few days, and to have the building well under construction before the end of December.
