The Bryan-Underwood Feud

The editor of a paper in Birmingham, Ala., the home city of Mr. Underwood and chief center of the iron and steel industry in the South, has opened fire vigorously on Mr. Bryan, as Mr. Underwood himself did on the floor of the House at the last session when he rose to a question of privilege especially to show that he was for a fight to the finish with the Nebraskan. No doubt with Mr. Underwood's approval the Birmingham editor submits some "startling facts" about the Baltimore convention, setting forth that Bryan, after abandoning and defeating Clark, tried at the last moment to beat Wilson also by a deal with the New York delegation in behalf of Gaynor. Bryan's real object, as this statement asserts, was to get the nomination himself. That he was a Barkis on the occasion is quite probable. But after wiping up the earth with the New York delegation it is not likely that he went to Murphy, Ryan and Parker with a sudden proposal to strike a partnership. The Alabama editor holds that Wilson owes Bryan nothing. But the country knows that Bryan personally brought about Wilson's nomination. It was done in the view of everybody, with each successive step in open convention.

This editorial fellow-townsmen of Mr. Underwood says "Bryan will never be offered a place in Wilson's cabinet unless Wilson decides that by this means he can preserve Democratic harmony by silencing the Nebraskan." The idea of silencing Bryan under any circumstances is amusing. It is not certain that he wants a seat at Mr. Wilson's council table. If he should be offered and accept a place there he will make himself heard beyond any other member. If he remains a Democrat at large he will have plenty to say. In each of his three battles he received at least 800,000 more votes than Wilson. The Baltimore platform put together by Bryan, favors a constitutional amendment limiting a president to one term, and declares that "we pledge the candidate of this convention to this principle." Bryan is an uncompromising free trader. Underwood and his editorial ally are riding for a speedy fall.
