A quiet wedding took place in this city on Wednesday evening at the bride's home, when Rev. D. L. Shrode united in marriage Sherman W. Conover and Susie Crane, both of whom are well known in this city.

The city council met on Monday evening and owing to the engineer being unable to be present on account of the tie-up on the railroad, the matter of remonstrances and objections to sewer and paving assessments were adjourned until the 20th January. Another meeting of the council will be held to clean up the business of the year.

Miss Grace Whitehouse, of Portland; Miss Florence Mitchell, of Baker City; S. H. Doak, of Lexington; Terry Beck and M. Ford of Portland, who spent the holidays in Tillamook left Wednesday morning for Sheridan by private conveyance.

Carl Haberlach was one of those who left on the train Sunday morning which was wrecked. He was on his way to Seattle to see whether he could dispose of two thousand cases of cheese which is now on hand belonging to the different co-operative companies.

Attorneys E. B. Tongue and G. R. Bagley, of Hillsboro, were in this city the first of the week in connection with the suit which is to be brought against the city in connection with the sewer and paving assessments. As the railroad was tied up they took a rig to Willamina.

Rollie W. Watson is meeting with a good deal of success in disposing of stock in the proposed whey milk sugar factory. He was at the different factories on Thursday explaining the situation to the dairymen, who are most interested and concerned in this new enterprise affecting their business.

The Board of County Commissioners convened on Thursday, and as there is always a large amount of business to be transacted the first of the year, including the annual levy, the Board will be in session for several days longer this term. County Commissioner-elect Edner, who does not take office until Monday, was present.

A. C. Gist died at 6 o'clock on Friday evening of last week, aged 82 years. Mr. Gist had been in poor health the past five years. He had been a resident of this county for 27 years and besides a widow leaves three sons and two daughters. He was buried in the G. A. R. cemetery, the funeral services being conducted by Rev. Hlalock.—Courier.

Frank Hanenkratt, of the Gem Theatre, made a flying trip to Portland this week for the interest of the house. The wreck and slides on Sunday had shut off the film service. Frank left Tuesday afternoon on horseback by the Sheridan road and returned Thursday by the same route, making the trip in 46 hours with a 5 hour stay in Portland. He brought 66 reels.

Died, in this city on Sunday last, Andrew Bibby, who was 40 years of age and single. He was born in Wisconsin and came to Tillamook 11 years ago and was a brother of James Bibby. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Donald A. Mackenzie in the Presbyterian church on Tuesday and the interment in the Oddfellows' cemetery. The deceased was a carpenter and he was a man who was well thought of in the community. His death came as a surprise to his relatives, who mourn his demise.

Mayor Harter has offered the recordership to Attorney J. L. Henderson, and in all probability he will accept. Attorney T. B. Handley was given the appointment and he accepted so as to wind up the business of the year, but handed in his resignation to take effect on the 8th, as he will leave in about a week to attend the State legislature as representative for Tillamook and Yamhill counties, and being appointed deputy district attorney, he would not have time to attend to the office of city recorder.

Died, on the 24th December, Mrs. Mary Agnes Eichinger, wife of R. Eichinger, after being sick for three weeks, aged 65 years. Deceased was born in Cork, Ireland, January 10, 1848. Her girlhood days were spent in Ireland and London, and she came to the United States in 1866. She was married to Robert Eichinger at Leroy, Wis., and seven daughters and two sons were born to this union, only three of whom survive. It will be remembered that the deceased lost two daughters a few years ago and a son two weeks since. The remains were buried in the Oddfellows' cemetery, and the bereaved family have the sympathy of the community.

Married, on Monday, Dec. 23rd, at the home of the bride's mother, at 161 East Thirteenth st., Eugene, Ore., by the bride's brother, Rev. Cornelius Beebe, Mr. U. G. Jackson and Miss Ethel Beebe. The bride is one of Lane County's best teachers and the groom is a popular young civil engineer and county surveyor of Tillamook county.—Register. The friends of County Surveyor Jackson will be glad to hear of this event and to congratulate him on his return to Tillamook with his bride, where he is highly respected as a citizen and county official. They were to return to this city on Thursday, but owing to the tie-up on the railroad it is not known when they will reach here.

Quite a sensation was caused in the city on Monday night by Earl Ford, who, while in an intoxicated condition, abused his wife and threatened to kill her. It is a wonder that Mrs. Earl was not seriously injured or murdered, for her husband shamefully ill treated and beat her, and had he been in possession of a gun it is thought that he would have shot his wife and then himself, for Ford was in a grouchy, sour mood as a result of the booze. He was placed under arrest by Sheriff Crenshaw and locked up in the county jail. Desiring to obtain a divorce from him Mrs. Ford agreed not to prefer a charge of wife beating against him, provided he would let her alone and leave the city. This Earl agreed to do. One of the penalties in Oregon for wife beating is flogging, and should Ford in any way molest his wife in future he will be immediately placed under arrest with that charge hanging over him.

The Mail Situation.

In answer to telegrams sent to Portland by the postmaster for authority to handle the mail by way of Tillamook-Willamina, on account of the tie-up on the railroad, a message was received Thursday from Portland wanting to know what the cost of service would be. A reply to this message was immediately wired to Portland.

In a situation like the present, had the postmaster of Tillamook City been given the discretionary power to expedite the mail service when it is held up, there would have been but little delay, as arrangements could have been made and the mail service resumed last Monday, whereas the best part of a week has elapsed with a large amount of mail matter held up at both ends. A few years ago, when it was impossible to get the mail across the mountains owing to the heavy snow that year, the Portland mail, day after day, was routed that way, but what brought immediate relief was a message sent to postal officials in Washington to have the mail routed by way of Sheridan, for at that time there was a star route between this city and that place.

Friday morning the wires on the Western Union were "dead," consequently no reply could be received from the postmaster's reply as to the cost of carrying the mail to Willamina. Anyway it will be several days before there is any mail, unless something has been done to route it to Willamina and bring it to Tillamook by wagon.
