Editorial Snap Shots.

We want to congratulate Bro. Botts on the excellent fight he put up.

If the snap shot man has fallen from grace, then the Christian spirit should be to pray for him instead of abusing him.

"It's our victory, Bro.," said one prominent "dry" Bro. to another last week. But it was a Waterloo, nevertheless.

The business men are well pleased with the result of Tuesday's election, for they looked at the situation for a business point of view and present conditions.

In making a 9 mill road tax this will enable the County Court to do considerable road work this year. The heavy travel on the roads in the vicinity of Tillamook City is the cause of the roads being cut up more than usual this winter, and to prevent this crushed rock will have to be used.

One uncharitable person belonging to the "wets" made the remark that a large number of women of this city must drink. That is not the case. The women voted "wet" because they did not want to see a dirty bootleg city again, for they know there was more drunkenness amongst the boys under that regime. This, we think, showed their good judgment and in giving them the franchise.

The power of the Press was again seen on Monday when the special edition of the Headlight made its appearance, which most everybody in the city read with a great deal of interest, and it set them to thinking from a business and property owner's standpoint, the result of which was a land slide for the "wets." The citizens voted for what they believed to be good advice from one who knew what was best for the circumstances, taking everything into consideration.

See what a mistake the "drys" made. The "wets" felt blue and thought that with the women vote the "drys" were in a majority. It would have been a good thing if the "wets" were kept thinking that way. The "drys" thinking, too, that they were in a majority, thought this an opportune time to close up the saloons. But, oh, what a surprise it was to both parties to find that the "wets" were twice as numerous as their opponents. Now the fight is over it must be conceded that it did more harm than good.

Blame it all on the snap shot man, for he can stand it. But we want to say this, that we do not know a time since our long connection with the Headlight that we have received so many hearty congratulations from all classes of citizens as we did on this occasion. It is impossible, however, for an editor to please everybody, and for that reason praises and curses look somewhat alike to us. So pleased were some of our neighbors that they called at the editor's home and congratulated him after he had retired for the night.

The snap shot man is not at all surprised at the result of the special city election on Tuesday, and we want to con-

gratulate the citizens, having to decide between two evils, they choose the lesser and that which was for the best interest of the city. The citizens have given their verdict by a two to one vote, which is pronounced enough to show that they are not in favor of a repetition of the bootleg system which prevailed here under local option. We have every confidence in the present city officials giving the city good clean business administration even if that body is "dry."

We are not in favor of invoking the recall on any of the city and county officials because they took some part in forcing an election on the liquor question. It will only create more friction in the city, and will do no good, even if the "wets" have a preponderance of votes. We disapprove of any move in that direction, and if the "wets" attempt it we will scrap them. We have implicit confidence in the present city officials in giving the city a good administration. They know the sovereign will of the people on the liquor question and should accept the verdict and act accordingly.

Politics and religion have no place in a district school, and teachers who take prominent part in a city election should be dismissed. This district has paid large sums of money in taxes to educate the pupils and pay the salaries of teachers, and the latter ought to have the good sense not to antagonize those who furnish the money to give this district a good public high school. Suppose the "wets" or persons belonging to the Catholic church had made an effort to get little innocent children from a district school to help their cause in a city election what a big howl some of the "drys" would have kicked up. The whole affair was a disgrace.

Cow Testing Association.

This afternoon a goodly number of ranchers met at the Commercial Club rooms and attended the first annual meeting of the Tillamook Cow Testing Association.

The past year's work of the association was discussed pro and con and many valuable points were brought out. While there was some dissatisfaction expressed, the majority of those present were well pleased with last year's showing and will still remain in the association.

It is necessary that there should be thirty members in the association, and while some may drop out it is expected that others will take their places. It is the intention of the society that each farmer enter 20 or somewhere near 20 cows in the test, which costs him \$1.00 each for the season. The tester makes a call at each rancher's place once every month and spends the day there. Harry Svenson was the tester for the past year and is reported to have given the very best of satisfaction.

Jas. Walton an Attorney.

County Court Business.

Pursuant to an order of adjournment made and entered on Friday, January 3rd, 1913, Court convened on Tuesday, January 7th, with the following members present: Hon. Homer Mason, Judge; H. M. Farmer, Geo. R. Edner, Commissioners; J. C. Holden, Clerk; H. Crenshaw, Sheriff.

In the matter of the petition of Rudolph Zweifel and others for a county road, same was continued.

In the matter of appointing road supervisors, it is ordered that the following named persons be appointed: Road District No. 1, D. F. Thompson; Road District No. 2, W. B. Alderman; Road District No. 3, J. M. Baker.

In the matter of the appointment of a county veterinary, it is ordered that Dr. J. E. Reedy be and is hereby appointed County Veterinary.

At this time the court proceeds to draw a jury list of more than 200 names from the assessment roll of the county to serve as jurors for 1913, said list being certified to by the clerk.

In the matter of designating county official papers, it is ordered that the Tillamook Headlight and the Tillamook Herald be designated as the county official papers for the sum of one hundred dollars each as compensation, said papers to print all of the official court calls, calls for warrants and for bids, proceedings of Commissioners' Court and other like publications, all of said matters to appear in both of the above named papers. It is further ordered that the printing of all blanks and like printing required by the different officers be distributed equally among the Cloverdale Courier, Bay City Examiner and the Nehalem Enterprise.

In the matter of purchasing supplies for the county officers, it is ordered that all supplies be referred to the county clerk, who is authorized to purchase such supplies as he shall deem proper and necessary for the different officers.

It is ordered that J. C. Bewley be and is hereby appointed Truant Officer for the year 1913.

It is ordered that Wm. Powell be, and is hereby appointed Constable for the Second Justice Precinct.

In the matter of the appointment of deputies for the various officers the following persons were named: Deputy County Clerk, K. Mills; Deputy County Clerk, Vida Rogers; Deputy Sheriff, Oscar Swenson; Deputy Assessor, R. L. Shreve.

In the matter of a tax levy for 1912 assessment roll, the County Court finds that it will require the sum of \$339,729.25 to defray the expenses of the county for the year 1913.
