### Editorial Snap Shots.

Talk about a square deal, this county has received a pretty bad deal in regard to mail since the tie-up on the railroad.

Those who are superstitious about the year 1913 must have become alarmed, for weather conditions this month have been bad, which put business on the bum.

Most of us think our little troubles look big, but when it comes to real, perplexing trouble the P. R. & N. have been up against it good and hard the last four weeks.

It is to be hoped that the County Court will make a start building a road to Bayocean this summer, for the taxpayers and property owners are justly entitled to a way out, considering the large amount of taxes they have paid.

Certainly the fish laws need reforming when a county receives no benefit from the fines imposed but the taxpayers have to pay the board bill when an offender decides to "sweat" it out. Why not call out Governor West and his tin soldiers?

One of the bills introduced in the state legislature at the request of Governor West is to prohibit saloons outside of incorporated cities. This gives the cities a monopoly of the business and deprives the people of their rights under the local option law or by petition.

Reform, why yes; reform the fellow who complains about the violation of law by other persons but allows his stock to run at large in a precinct where stock is not allowed to run at large. We don't see any difference between that individual and a bootlegger, for they both commit a misdemeanor.

We hope the Bay City Examiner is no criterion to go by, for every once in a while it has a grouch against this city or someone residing here. Its attack on the County Court last week was unjust and uncalled for. It was the mumbblings of a man who was talking through his hat endeavoring to create strife and ill-feeling.

It is certainly unfortunate for Tillamook County that the P. R. & N. should be meeting with

so much serious trouble with slides and other accidents. For four weeks the road have been out of commission, and during that time the railroad officials have been bucking all kinds of weather in their endeavor to repair the damage done by the heavy rain storms and snow, and at enormous expense.

During the past year Tillamook City made considerable progress in public and private improvements, which gave it a clean looking, up-to-date business appearance. With still more improvements which are to be undertaken this year, it is safe to say that when these are finished the city will have a much better appearance, making it one of the most substantial cities in Western Oregon.

It is gratifying to know the Port of Bay City has won its friendly suit in the Supreme Court. Now push a channel through the bar as soon as possible, for it is good news to know that the government's offer will soon be accepted and the remaining \$300,000 appropriated. In another two years the central part of Tillamook county will have one of the best harbors between the Columbia river and San Francisco, doing a big lumber business. Watch Tillamook County grow from now on.

Some of our leading citizens went to Bay City last week for a conference over the Port situation and another meeting is to be held in this city on Saturday afternoon at the Commercial Club. We sincerely hope that some understanding can be arrived at which will be satisfactory to all sections, as there is a desire to get together under one Port. But we have our misgivings whether this can be brought about speedily. It is a matter of much regret that the delay in the improvement of the bar is caused by different sections not pulling together.

How easy it is to get people worked up over something they do not properly understand, and as another illustration of this some of our citizens became unduly alarmed over the special election which was to have taken place on Thursday, but which was called off. All the resolutions were prepared by the City Attorney at the request of some of the citizens. And it would not surprise us much to be informed that the opposition to the election originated by those who think they can make

"easy money," as used to be case, when city warrants were discounted. There is method in some peoples madness. There you have it in a nutshell why a sudden opposition bloomed out and the election was called off by the city officials, for they saw it would be defeated.

There is no disputing the fact that some of the teachers in the district school have taken too active an interest in city politics. The two recent city elections are convincing proof, and if there is to be a reform movement in this city a little reformation amongst the those teachers who have made themselves obnoxious to the patrons and taxpayers of the district is now perfectly in order. We contend that any teacher in a district school who interests themselves to such an extent in a city election to go around amongst the voters and instruct them how to vote and accuse Mayor Harter of "grafting" ought not to be winked at by the members of the School Board. Anyway, it is our judgment that it is for the best interest of the school if a few married women who are teaching were home and attending to their domestic duties, the district school would not have been dragged into city politics. For a number of years the affairs of the district school have gone along pleasantly and without friction, but since some few teachers have busied themselves in city politics, there is a spirit of resentment amongst the taxpayers.

### Compensation.

In the session of the legislature now convening there will come up, amongst other important things, a measure to be enacted into law under the title of workmen's compensation, and we feel that the employers generally, as well as those who are interested in the welfare of the state, should lend their assistance and harmonize upon some measure that will give to the workmen and his family the protection that he can only get now through long and litigious contests in which the ambulance chasing lawyer usually rakes off the cream of any award that he might get in court.

The Governor's compensation commission has labored faithfully and no doubt has endeavored to draft a measure that would meet the approval of all concerned, and while it is not ideal in all its provisions, it is only fair that it should be carefully considered in all its essentials and enacted into a law by the Legislature now in session.

We understand that certain employers, some of the labor unions and more of the liability insurance companies are actively opposed, but for the best interests of the state and in assurance to outside capital that it will be safe to operate, some sort of a compensation law must be placed upon our statute books, if we as a state shall go on increasing prosperity.

Workmen's compensation legislation has come to stay. To stand in the way of equitable laws is worse than folly. Humane as well as economic considerations demand the early adoption of workmen's compensation laws in every state of the Union. If the progressive element among legislators, employers, wage workers, insurance experts and the public at large do not settle this problem in an economic, efficient and humane fashion it will be settled for us with a vengeance by the demagogue and agitator. Fourteen states have already enacted workmen's compensation laws of one kind or another. There is little uniformity among these laws and their respective merits are problematic. Reasonable uniformity is an essential requirement to the future success of workmen's compensation legislation in the United States. There is nothing that will promote uniformity and progress more than a general knowledge of laws already enacted.
