

Better Dairy Herds Are Law-maker's Hope.

Estimating that about a third of the dairy cows of the state do not even pay their board, and desiring to bring the dairy industry up to the highest possible standard, Representative Weeks, of Marion County, will introduce a bill in the House this week, providing for the creation of cow-testing associations.

The carrying out of the provisions of the bill is delegated to Prof. Kent, head of the dairy department of the Oregon Agricultural College, and it is provided that he shall be entitled to his actual traveling expenses, but that he shall receive no compensation. Further, it is provided that he may from time to time appoint field assistants, and that, whenever any community shall have formed a cow-testing association and made provisions for half of the funds to conduct it, these field assistants shall assume charge of testing the cows for the associations and give all possible information with regard to feeding, breeding, and the general management of dairy herds.

Representative Weeks has also introduced a bill defining what shall constitute adulterated ice cream, and one providing that any milk inspector or his agents who connive at the violation of the milk laws shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

All of the bills have the indorsement of State Dairy and Food Commissioner Mickle.

Gives Counties Right To Issue Road Bonds.

Satisfied that had not the ballot at the last general election been burdened with initiative and referendum measures a bill fathered by the State Grange, giving counties the right to issue bonds to build roads would have carried, Representative Hurd, of Lane County, at the request of the grange introduced a duplicate of the bill rejected by the voters. C. E. Spence, master of the State Grange, was there early in the session conferring with the Legislators with relation to the measure and the fact that it was introduced last week is taken as an indication that he considers the prospects for its passage excellent.

Representative Reames, of Jackson and Douglas Counties, has also introduced a bill on this subject, and the committee on roads and highways so far considered it favorably. The two bills are much alike, the difference being that the Reames bill does not provide for the calling of conventions to decide what roads shall be built or the amount of bonds to be issued. His bill provides that upon petition the County Court shall call an election for the purpose of having the people vote bonds and to determine the roads to be built. Another difference is that it provides for the issuance of serial bonds, and that one-twentieth of the sum called for by the bonds issued shall be paid each year.

Measures Provides County Road Board.

Representatives Gill of Clackamas and Hurd of Lade offered a bill for the creation of a county road board of three members, taking the appointment of road supervisors away from the County Court and placing them in the board's hands. The measure also gives the board the power to levy assessments for the construction of roads in the county, and makes incorporated cities road districts.

Hurd offered a bill which provides that an annual election shall be held for road supervisors.

Recall of Congressmen and Senators Urged.

SALEM, Or., Jan. 23.—Lawrence of Multnomah has introduced a bill in the House providing for the recall of United States Senators and Congressmen. The bill provides that candidates must sign one of two statements, one pledging resignation within 24 hours after official returns show that at an election the recall has carried, the other that they will not heed the recall. Petitions for a recall election shall bear 20,000 signatures if for a United States Senator and 7000 from a Congressional District if for a Congressman.

Rand says the bill is vicious and he will enlist the assistance of every sheriff and prosecutor in the state to invoke the referendum if it should pass. Rand, like Senator McCulloch and Governor West, is a Democrat. Other Sheriffs and District Attorneys are coming in to fight the measure.
