TO BOOST THE CLUB. Recommended Appropriation of \$250,000 for the San Francisco Fair.

An important meeting of the Commercial Club was held at the Club room on Tuesday evening. Information that the Club is still in debt and that immediate action would be necessary to keep the organization in existence brought out a large attendance and many ideas for the betterment of conditions.

Hereafter, the Club's by-laws will be strictly adhered to. No persons, not members, will be admitted to the rooms except by visitor's card or to attend public meeting for which the rooms may be used.

A committee of three was appointed to approach delinquent members in an effort to collect outstanding dues and accounts. Names of members and a record of the date to which time they have paid dues will be conspicuously posted in the Club rooms and all members who are more than two months in arrears will be barred from the rooms until the back dues have been paid.

Although the Club has pressing obligations which must be met, it is by no means solvent. The furniture and fittings of the Club rooms are alone amply sufficient to cover all its debts. The difficulty in the past has been that the income has been so little in excess of the necessary expenditures that progress has been slow.

Another meeting will be held on Wednesday, February 5, at which the committees will report and further steps will be planned. Ralph Cady, Dr. Kerron and Burr Beals, Jr. have undertaken to arrange a smoker and additional stunts for the evening.

Aside from looking after the Club's own interests, the members instructed the Secretary to notify the district's legislators to vote for an appropriation of \$250,000 for the State representation at the San Francisco fair. The secretary was also instructed to ask the State Railway Commission to investigate the railroad troubles and hasten the return of train service.
