#### TO BOOST THE CLUB. Reccommended Appropriation of \$250,000 for the San Francisco Fair.

An important meeting of the Commercial Club was held at the Club room on Tuesday evening. Information that the Club is still in debt and that immediate action would be necessary to keep the organization in existence brought out a large attendance and many ideas for the betterment of conditions.

Hereafter, the Club's by-laws will be strictly adhered to. No persons, not members, will be admitted to the rooms except by visitor's card or to attend public meeting for which the rooms may be used. The Club rooms are not to be rented to anyone or for any purpose without an adequate charge. Even the council is to be restricted to one of the smaller rooms, and an additional charge will be made when the attendance at a council meeting requires the use of the large hall.

A committee of three was appointed to approach delinquent members in an effort to collect outstanding dues and accounts. Names of members and a record of the date to which time they have paid dues will be conspicuously posted in the Club rooms and all members who are more than two months in arrears will be barred from the 99 rooms until the back dues have 100 been raid. A resolution that each member pledge himself to bring in a ..ew member within 30 days or pay the initiation fee of a new member was also adopted. The day night, January 23 for the purprovision of the constitution providing for a \$10 initiation fee for resident members and a \$5 fee for non-resident members will be restored to its original terms by which new members are required to pay a \$25 fee. This action was deferred to the next meeting in accordance with the by-laws.

Although the Club has pressing obligations which must be met, it is by no means solvent. The furniture and fittings of the Club rooms are alone amply sufficient to cover all its debts. The difficulty in the past has been that the income has been so little in excess of the necessary expenditures that progress has been slow. With the effort that is now being put forth the Club should receive enough to

A large number of people responded to the call of the commissioners of the Ports of Bay City and Tillamook on Saturday and a better understanding of the conditions surrounding the proposed reorganization of the Port of Tillamook resulted. Atty. C. W. Talmage, who presided, explained the purpose of the meeting as an effort to shape "The Red Red Rose" and "Jennie" the meeting as an effort to shape matters so as to form one Port of matters so as to form one Port of Tillamook Bay. This, the commissioners thought, would meet the approval of the farmers who have in the past opposed the ports.
