Brick and Tile Industry.

E. G. Krebs and his brother, who have decided to put in a brick and tile plant on the property they bought from G. B. Lamb at South Prairie, are anxious to get started, so as to get to business as soon as possible. They are handicapped in getting their machinery there, as they are waiting for a piece of road to be graveled, and cannot do so until it is. This is an industry which will be of great benefit to the county, for in building heretofore the brick problem was an expensive item. When this industry is started it will mean that pressed brick will be obtained in this city for \$11 or \$12 a thousand and tiling also at a very low figure, which will be brought to this city in auto trucks from the brick yard. The Krebs Bros. have come here and have not asked for a subsidy nor for any of the citizens to subscribe stock, but will invest \$30,000 in an industry which will be of much benefit. As soon as this road is graveled, which should be done at once, the Krebs Bros. will ship their plant in and commence work.

THE COURT'S BUDGET.
How the Taxes, Amounting to \$389,729.25, Will be Spent.

For the information of a correspondent and taxpayers who may want to know how the tax money to be collected this year, amounting to \$389,729.25 will be expended, we give below the budget as compiled by the County Court at its January term. It will be seen that \$175,000 will be used for bridges and roads and \$45,000 for public schools, which eats up considerable of the tax money, which, however is disbursed again over the entire county. Added to this is \$59,767.75 to pay off the county's indebtedness and place it on a cash basis, and \$18,231.00 for State tax. Another large item is \$10,000 for a poor farm. What the present State Legislature will do to add more expenditures is hard to tell, but it is safe to say that the County Court will find that before the year has expired it will have a good many calls for additional expense that it did not figure on when it made out its annual budget. These figures do not include special taxes. Following are the different items:
