Alfred Russell Wallace, the "grand old man of science" in England, who last month celebrated hie 90th birthday, in a notable interview for the London Daily News took an extremely severe view of the present status of the so-called civilization. He said he had come to the general conclusion that there had been "no advance either in in-tellect or morals from the days of tellect or morals from the days of the earliest Egyptians and Syrians down to the keel laying of the latest dreadnaught." He admitted that there had been a general accumu-lation of human knowledge, but for all that "we are no more clever than the ancients." Reviewing the social and industrial environment during the period of his own life, Wallace said: "What pro-gress has been made? In every detail of that progress, throughout all the great mercantile, the manu facturing operations, abominable vice going on, every kind of cruelty on the poor and the children, adulteration everywhere in every modity and lies everywhere Every thing is as bad as it can possibly be. There exist in our midst hor rors never known before and dread ful diseases never known before. and yet nothing is ever done. Therefore, I declare that from top to bottom our whole social environment is rotton and full of vice and everything that is bad, and until selection comes in and a thorough weeding out takes place, rottenness and vice and badness will con-tinue." Nevertheless, in a later remark the old man, with a chuckle, said he did not think the outlook
