Lydia F. Severance entered into eternal rest at her home, 1020 N. First St., N. Yakima, Wash., February 11. She is survived by her husband and four children, Atty. Abel W. Severance, Abbie F. Maser, Etta Severance of N. Yakima, and Edward W. Severance, of Donald Wash., also two brothers, I. F. Weston, of Motley, Minn., and H. E. Weston, of Tillamook, Oregon. Mrs. Severance, whose maiden name was Lydia F. Weston, was born in Bloomfield, Summerset Co., Maine, Sept. 28, 1830. Early in life she moved with her parents to Belleville, Wis., where she lived the greater part of her life. In 1853 she was united in marriage to Joseph Severance.
 She moved from there with her family to Oregon in 1896 where she lived a short time then came to the above city where she has since resided.
 Much of Mrs. Severance's life has been that of a pioneer, with all its trials, hardships and privations, but in the face of all difficulties she rounded out one of the noblest of lives, being a loving wife and mother, and zealously devoted to her friends and church to which she united in early life.

DIRTY METHODS Used to Incriminate Respectable Citizens.

Ex-Councilman Carl Knudson caused a genuine sensation at the meeting of the city council on Monday night which have disgusted a large number of our citizens because an attempt was made to incriminate and railroad some of our citizens to the state penitentiary. Mayor Harter presided and Councilmen Harrison, Bales, Leach and Dick were present, with a good number of citizens. It seems that Mr. Knudson had told several of the citizens that he was going to make a statement, the nature of which he would not say, so there was some speculation as to what he was going to divulge.
 After some routine business had been disposed of Mayor Harter told Mr. Knudson to proceed with what he had to say to the city council.
 Mr. Knudson commenced by saying, "Mr. Mayor, gentlemen of the council and fellow citizens, I want to make a statement in regard to something that affects my character." Mr. Knudson seemed so worked up on account of something which had occurred that he could hardly proceed. He then told of a stranger coming to the store of the Jones-Knudson Furniture Co., who made overtures to buy the furniture stock. The man gave his name as J. J. Cameron. This was two or three weeks since and he and Mr. Jones had several conversations in regard to the sale of the stock of furniture. The stranger left this city with the understanding that he wanted to see his brother in Portland. Knudson received a letter from the man asking him to come to Portland, and last Monday week he went there, the appointment being for the next day. After being put off several times, finally a meeting was arranged for, which, much to Mr. Knudson's surprise, was in the office of the Burns' Detective Agency. Having nothing to fear from an investigation he was put through a severe grilling for nearly six hours. When the investigation commenced Mr. Knudson told the man that he supposed there were some instruments in the room whereby everything would be taken down, but he was assured that this was not the case. The man asked Mr. Knudson whether he was a Mason and assured him that he belonged to that order, and showed him some receipts. The man told Knudson that since he had left Tillamook one of the councilmen had confessed and that they were going to put some of them over the road. He told Knudson that he had better "cough up," but Knudson told him he had nothing to "cough up."
 Here Mr. Knudson was so overcome with emotion that he could not proceed, but after a time he gained his composure and proceeded. This took place several times while he was making his statement. He then said that the man tried every conceivable way to make him incriminate himself and give some evidence against the mayor and the other councilmen. He was told that the mayor and councilmen were to be paid certain sums of money, and that the Warren Construction Company's books showed that he was to receive \$5,000 when the assessment was made. The man then made an effort to have Knudson remain in Portland two weeks in his employ, promising to pay him for procuring evidence to incriminate Mayor Harter and the other members of the city council and the Warren Construction Co. He informed Knudson that he had a new piano, also that his wife had a lot of new clothes. Mr. Knudson evinced the proceedings by saying that there was a new baby at his home, and it was a wonder some of the citizens were not accusing him of receiving it from the Warren Construction Company. Mr. Knudson was also informed that the mayor and the councilmen who served him had also been investigated, viz., Vantress' banking account was \$5,000 which he obtained from the sale of a timber claim, which would soon be increased. The mayor had built a new house and his bank account was the same as it was before he did so. Maddux and Sappington were known all over the county as noted grafters. Leach may be an honest man but he acted awfully strange. Beals had told the man that he believed Knudson to be honest. These were the accusations which the man made against the mayor and the members of the city council. Finding that there was nothing doing by way of obtaining evidence to prove these accusations, the man tried to explain to Knudson how he could implicate Attorney Huntington, who represents the Warren Construction Company. He told Knudson to go to Huntington and get something out of him. Also advised him to go to Mr. Speaker on the same errand. They could put him wise where he could get something, but Mr. Knudson declined to do anything of the kind, as he was not that kind of a man to implicate anyone in such a dicker of that character and become a tool in the hands of anybody to do dirty work, for he is too upright and conscience citizen. Mr. Knudson said there were a great many other things he could tell which took place while he was in the sweat box, but he thought he had said enough to convince everybody of the dirty methods used in making an investigation to incriminate himself and others, and closed by saying it was dirty business and, with some indignation, "I challenge them to go ahead with their investigation and prove me guilty of grafting or ge-

The Contract Signed.

Russell Hawkins received a telegram from Senator Bourne on Monday morning, announcing that the sub-committee on appropriations had recommended the senator's amendment to the appropriation bill, giving Tillamook Bay \$300,000 for bay and harbor improvements and placing the project on a continuous contract basis. The recommendations of the sub-committee will undoubtedly pass the entire committee and the matter will then be in the hands of the engineers.
 Mr. Hawkins announces this puts the matter entirely in the hands of the government, who will call for whatever money they can need in connection with the project. It will do away with the necessity of playing politics in the future. This means that, should it be necessary to spend more than \$407,000 to complete the improvements, it will not be necessary to ask congress for the extra money.
 Mr. Hawkins arrived in the city Saturday afternoon accompanied by John Edwards.
 The Port Commission received a contract from the government this week regarding the construction of the jetty. The contract is to be signed by the Port, the bank furnishing the money and the government in which the port promises to furnish the \$407,000 necessary for the work, the bank agrees to take the bonds and the government to do the work, supplying the rest of the remainder of the money.
 The contract was properly signed and executed by the port and immediately mailed to Washington.—Bay City Examiner.
