A telegram was received on Saturday from Congressman Hawley stating that the conference committee had agreed upon the senate amendment to the rivers and harbors bill for the appropriation of \$107,000 for the improvement of Tillamook Bar.

W. HOLMES APPOINTED CIRCUIT JUDGE.

T. B. Handley to be County District Attorney.

The State legislature turned Tillamook, Yamhill and Polk counties into the 12th Judicial district, and the bill authorizes the governor to appoint a Circuit Judge at a salary of \$4500 a year. The appointment, of course, will go to some personal friend of the governor, but the appointee will not take office until the ninety days after the adjournment of the State legislature and will hold until the state and county election in November of next year. Another change is in giving each county a prosecuting attorney, who will be appointed by the governor. The salary of the Prosecuting Attorney for Tillamook county is placed at \$1200 a year.

We are reliably informed that Governor West will appoint Attorney Webster Holmes circuit judge for the 12th Judicial district and Attorney T. B. Handley for district attorney for Tillamook county. Mr. Holmes is a personal friend of Governor West and this is the reason, no doubt, that he appointed him. A telephone message from Salem this afternoon stated that the Governor had appointed Mr. Holmes this morning to the dignified and honorable position, which his friends feel assured he will fill with credit to himself and the bench and to Governor West, who had confidence in his legal ability to make good. We understand there were several other aspirants in the other counties. Congratulations are now in order.

STILL FIGHTING OVER STREET PAVEMENT.

Another Lively Meeting of Citizens.

The contending forces in the street pavement controversy had another encounter on Friday afternoon and evening at the Court House, which was packed with citizens who were anxious to hear the reports and the discussion. Mayor Harter and Councilmen Sappington, Leach, Bales, Harrison and Dick were present with the other city officials.

Engineer Richardson was present, and presented a report which was prepared by H. L. Gilbert, of the firm of Gilbert & Hall, which he stood back of. Another report was read from Prof. G. V. Skelton, who had made an examination of the pavement and made a test of the samples with Prof. S. H. Graf, of the Oregon Agricultural College. This report stated one of the reasons that the pavement was poor was that it was chargeable to poor workmanship and lack of proper bearing power in the foundation, and to the use of sand and asphaltic cement instead of the prescribed bitulithic surfacing material.

It was over these points that a long discussion took place pro and con, Attorney C. W. Talmage, F. R. Beals and A. G. Bealstaking the most prominent part in attempting to discredit the pavement.

Nothing definite was arrived at one way or the other and the city council adjourned to meet again on Monday.

Before adjournment a resolution was passed endorsing the work of the citizen's committee.

Another city council meeting was held on Monday evening, with Mayor Harter and all the council men present with a good sprinkling of citizens, when the street paving controversy was resumed. A resolution was passed appointing Councilmen Harrison and Bales to make further investigation.

A. J. Hill, of the Warren Construction Co., with Attorney Huntington, were present, and made a statement. He said they wanted pay for the work they had done and objected to the matter being delayed, which entailed an expenditure of about \$900 a month upon the company for interest. He said they were surely entitled to some pay for the work they had done in constructing the sewer and curbing, as

well as for the pavement. He thought he should receive part payment for the work and was willing to take 80 per cent until such time as they had come to such conclusion about the pavement. What ever was defective about the pavement the Warren Construction Co. was ready to make good to the satisfaction of the city council.

F. R. Beals and W. G. Dwight raised objections to this, for fear that it would commit the city council to the acceptance of the work.

Councilman Harrison said he was not in a position to pass on the pavement controversy at that time, and as samples had been sent to some reliable parties, which would take about two weeks before they could obtain a report, he thought it only right that the city should shoulder the interest which would amount to about \$400, whereupon he moved the following resolution:

"That it is the sense of the common council that the Warren Construction Company be allowed interest from this date at the rate of six per cent per annum on such amount, if any, as it may be found they are entitled to be paid at the time on account of the sewer and paving contracts."

This passed, which ended another of the many controversies which have taken place in this city. This satisfied Mr. Hill.

T. Coates was appointed on the Library Board and Stillwell Park Board.

Senator Root of New York is quoted in a Washington interview as favoring the convening of a special national convention of the Republican party at Chicago this year for the purpose of changing the rules in two important respects, as follows: First, to make representation in national conventions proportionate in the Republican vote and thus abolish the system of Southern state delegations; and, second, to permit each state to decide for itself the manner of selecting delegates to national conventions.

The latest development in the trailing of the "vice trust" of New York is the confession of a notorious woman dive-keeper awaiting sentence in the Tombs, Rosie Hertz. She has kept her check stubs showing to whom and how much she paid for years, and this evidence is to be given to the grand jury. Prior to this Inspector Sweeney was indicted and it is thought he may give away the names of the higher-ups.
