This case grew out of the death of William Campbell, who was killed at Wheeler by a freight train, the plaintiff claiming that the death was caused through the company's agents carelessly and negligently operating a locomotive with freight cars attached.

The Oregon Manufacturers' Association has recently inaugurated a campaign throughout the state for the betterment and extension of home industries, and for the advocacy of the use of home-made goods. As a chief apostle to carry this doctrine to the people, Edyth Tozier Weathered is now visiting the various localities of Western Ore-

gon and interesting the people in the home industry movement, the movement that gives employment to our own people and keeps the dollars at home.

Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock John Borba, of Beaver, and A. M. Berba of Tillamook, with two friends from the latter city, were caught on a sandspit in Tillamook Bay by the rising tide, while digging clams. The tide carried off their boat and left them in a dangerous situation until E. T. Heas, of Hobsonville, in a rowboat, took them off. The powerboat from the lifesaving station at Goribaldi, under command of Captain Axel Anderson, also arrived on the scene, but the men already had been taken away.

George W. Coffman, 67 years old, who died March 11, at his home in Tillamook, crossed the plans in 1852 with his parents, who settled in Oregon. Later he secured a farm in Upper Willamina where he remained until 1893, moving to Tillamook. One of Mr. Coffman's characteristics was his friendship with the Indians, who soon learned to trust him. He was always in their confidence. Three daughters, Mrs. J. A. Gray and Mrs. John Pike, Portland, and Mrs. Alva Johnson, Barton Ore., two brothers, Nathan and Levi, Seaside, and a sister, Mrs. Sarah Donaldson, Vancouver, Wash., survive him.

Attorney General Crawford has rendered an opinion that state legislators cannot be appointed to an elective office, and if Governor West is ruled by that decision he will not be able to appoint Attorney T. B. Handley county attorney. There is a difference of opinion amongst the attorneys whether the attorney general is right. Governor West, however, advised Mr. Handley that he would appoint him, but under the circumstances the latter feels that he should be governed by the Attorney General's opinion and he advised the governor to that effect. This will leave the field open for aspirants, the names of Attorney Willett, Clausen and Goyne being recommended.

The St. Patrick social and dance at the Commercial Club on Monday evening was a success, both from a social function as well as financially. The amount of cash taken in was \$90.50 for baskets and \$38 for dance tickets, which will net the club over \$100 after the expenses have been paid. County Clerk Holden was the most spirited bidder, for he paid \$10.50 for his basket, while W. G. Tait, C. I. Clough, B. W. Gordon and C. E. Reed ran theirs up to \$5.00. There was a "joker," however, amongst the basket, for one, which was profusely covered with green, contained four large potatoes rapped in tissue paper. It was knocked down by Sheriff Crenshaw, who acted as auctioneer, for \$1.50. Mrs. Evelyn Rhodes and Miss Florence Evans entertained the audience with vocal solos and E. E. Koch with a violin solo. The committee was composed of Rollie W. Watson, S. M. Kerron, R. Cady, B. Mendenhall and Dr. Perkins.
