## Death of Stella Wallace.

We are sorry to announce the death of Miss Stella Wallace, which took place on Monday at the home of Al Bunn at Beaver. Her age was 17 years, 4 months and 24 days. Her health had been failing for about three months, but it was not until about two or three weeks ago that her illness became serious. At that time she had gone to Al Bunn's for a rest, but was taken sick and died there, the cause being tuberculosis. The remains were buried on Wednesday at Beaver, the Rev. Dora Young, of the U. B. Church, conducting the religious services, which were attended by a large number of the residents in that part of the county, where the deceased young woman was highly respected and beloved by a large number of friends. Many beautiful floral offerings were sent as a token of respect. The deceased leaves a father, five brothers and two sisters. She was the daughter of Bud Wallace.

## Tillamook and Wisconsin Cheese Markets.

Cheese is moving off fairly well at 16 cents Portland or 15 1/2 cents Tillamook, with indications of market being lower soon. Wisconsin is offering Twins at 13 cents and Daisies at 13 1/2 cents, with about a two cent freight rate to the Coast markets. However, Tillamook stocks are still too small to cut much of a figure in the market and should the local market be reduced it might not stop Eastern cheese coming West. Last fall when the market was 18 cents, several buyers went to Wisconsin and bought cheese that cost them 19 cents and afterwards got sore because the local market was reduced and they lost money. Merchants buying Eastern cheese will probably lose money again if they buy now, as our market will probably go down if they bring in Eastern goods, for our cheese has to be sold regardless of Eastern prices. Had the Wisconsin dealers done what the local factories did, and reduced the prices a couple of months ago, they would now be facing a clean market. All Tillamook cheese is sold

## T. B. Handley Made Good.

Salem, Or., March 20th:—In reviewing the work of the recent session of the Legislature, Speaker C. N. McArthur today paid a high compliment to Representative T. B. Handley of Tillamook and Yamhill Counties.

"Mr. Handley was one of our best men," said the Speaker. "He was an earnest and sincere worker in the cause of many meritorious measures before the house, and his services upon the judiciary committee were particularly valuable. Mr. Handley showed himself to be a big, broad-gauged legislator and the people of his district will do well to re-elect him if he desires another term."

Speaker McArthur also stated that the recent session enacted more constructive legislation than any other session in the history of the state, and that the sum total of the appropriations was \$350,000 less than the amount appropriated in 1911.
