**Editorial Snap Shots.**

"Beat it!" That appears to be the aim and object of some of our citizens.

We wish to state that a wonderful change for the better came over the city this week. There wasn't any bullyrag meetings.

It is sheep shearing times in Eastern Oregon and in Tillamook City high priced attorneys are shearing the city and the citizens.

Clean up the town and use a little paint to improve business houses and residences. Now is the time to brighten up the city and the homes.

Compared with the bad weather in other sections of the country, Tillamook county has gone through another comparatively mild winter.

Was it Democratic weather or the unlucky number of 1913 that sent a cyclone through Omaha and placed Eastern and Middle West States in the grip of one the most severe storms of the winter?

Why object to paving fifth street? With the location of the depot east of town there is every reason to believe that it is liable to make one of the best streets in the city. The way to kill it is to oppose street improvements.

When citizens rush headlong into litigation under the impulse of some excitement they are apt to be badly "stung" before they get through lawing. That is bad enough, but it is too bad that all the taxpayers should be "stung," too, and made to foot the expense bills and high priced attorneys' fees.

Roughly estimating attorneys fees and other expenses at from \$5000 to \$8000 on account of some of our citizens getting the city into litigation, it looks like throwing away a lot of money, which would do a whole lot of good had it been put to better use advertising the city and giving it a boost. Instead of the city getting a boost the high priced attorneys are to reap a rich harvest.

In helping to boost the county, don't be narrow minded. Every part of the county needs boosting, for what helps one section helps the entire county. This is the proper boosting spirit for all sections to display. We have a splendid county with many undeveloped resources and summer attractions, and as it is practically in its infancy, every part of the county needs more development.

Some of our misguided citizens have plunged the city into expensive litigation, and as a consequence the city and those citizens who were roped in are undergoing the process of being plucked by high priced attorneys, all of which might have been avoided were it not for personal spleen which were the underlying motives of those who started the ruction. However, since the city is thrown into expensive litigation we are inclined to think that it is going to cost a barrel of money before it is through with.

How is this going to work out, anyway? As the assess-

ment was turned down by the city council, it seems that if the construction company wins out in the law suit, the whole of the taxable property of the city will have to pay for street improvements, for it is the city and not the property owners that is being sued. If it pans out that way, the property owner who has no pavement in front of his property will have to help pay for those who have. Well, some of our citizens have forced the city into expensive litigation, and it would not be surprise us much to hear that they were praying for deliverance.

Tillamook City is to have two more large buildings, one to be erected by the Oddfellows and the others by the Masons, which will cost \$50,000 and add much to the stability and appearance of the city. Concrete and brick buildings are gradually taking the place of frame buildings, and as there is less danger of fire, the more up-to-date buildings are crowding out the fire-traps which contained stock of goods that invoiced large sums. The completion of the new bank and hotel buildings this spring, and the erection of the Oddfellows' and Masons' buildings, coupled with more street pavement and cement sidewalks, the city is making a steady growth along permanent lines, and at the same time causing a transformation in the business center of the county.

Notwithstanding the efforts of the Commercial Clubs of this county to engage in publicity work with the object of securing new settlers and new enterprises, the Bay City Examiner is out with its little hammer going through the "knocking" performance again. What the clubs aim to do is to boost the entire county and to obtain the best results in the expenditure of the small amount of \$1,500, when \$10,000 could be used to good advantage in advertising the county this year. We hope that the Examiner does not express the sentiment of the Bay City Commercial Club, for that organization has always shown a disposition to help boost, and we feel confident that it is in hearty sympathy with the Sunset Magazine-Southern Pacific plan adopted by the County Court and the commercial organizations. "Crazy Bill" is certainly acting in the capacity of a "scare crow" for that city and its commercial club.

The severe weather in the East will have a tendency to cause a large number of home seekers to come to the Northwest. What a splendid opportunity this affords Tillamook County to obtain new settlers, where blizzards, zero weather, drought, excessive heat and crop failures are unknown. That is the kind of country home seekers are desirous of finding, and to impart these facts require united effort and the expenditure of money to boost the county. Other sections of Oregon are hustling and successful in obtaining new settlers, because advertising pays. To bring about the same results in Tillamook County a do-nothing policy won't do, and street corner croakers do a great deal of harm. This is a splendid section of country, the best in Oregon for successful and profitable dairying and undeveloped timber resources; and Tillamook City has a splendid future before it, destined to have a large population.

The question of the downfall of young women is causing considerable discussion in newspapers and magazines, and as the social evil is a hard problem to deal with in the Press, it is to be hoped that some good will result from it, for the white slave traffic is a national crime. Many are the reasons given why young girls join the ranks and become white slaves, who live lives of shame for a few years and then pass to premature graves unloved and unmourned. Parents, small wages and gay company may all help to contribute to the downfall of young women, but we want to add this to the list that it is the male sex that is largely responsible, and when public sentiment is aroused to such an extent to arrest and convict men who make white slaves of women, it would soon put a stop to some of the flagrant and wholesale prostitution. Two of the most difficult problems, especially in large cities, is to know how to handle the peoples' appetites and passions. More

latitude they are given lower, it seems, the moral standard becomes. Any movement that will curtail the white slave traffic should meet with general approval, but lay the sin at the door of men who participate in the white slave traffic.

**Friedmann Tells of His Vaccine Cure.**

After having treated several more patients in a New York hospital with his alleged vaccine or serum cure for consumption, Dr. Frederick Friedmann went to Ottawa, Canada, early in the week. There he treated a number of cases under the inspection of physicians and on Wednesday before the Canadian Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis he made his first public explanation of his discovery.

He began by referring to the recognized fact that in the bacillus itself were to be found the substances which produce the curative tuberculosis, but said all previous methods had dealt with the toxic and virulent bacilli from human or bovine patients and that hence the cultures had never been certainly free from toxic qualities capable of bad effects on the person treated. His problem had been to find an avirulent and atoxic bacillus and to do this without chemical additions or incisive measures. It must remain non-poisonous in the tubercular as well as in the nontubercular individual. Only a live bacillus could be used. These conditions he had found by using a cold-blooded animal—the turtle. By frequent transplantations the turtle bacillus lost even its small amount of toxic qualities and in that condition he had first applied it to human patients. He had first tried it on himself, then to adult persons having tuberculosis, and finally on children victims of the disease. Then he had used it on well children to immunize them. It had proved harmless and in all except the most advanced cases had had a highly curative effect.

Nevertheless, Dr. Friedmann has steadily refused to give to the medical profession or to the United States public health authorities the precise method he employs in producing the vaccine from his cultures or the size of the dose he administers. He says he will not give this out until the government doctors have recognized improvement in the patients treated by him.

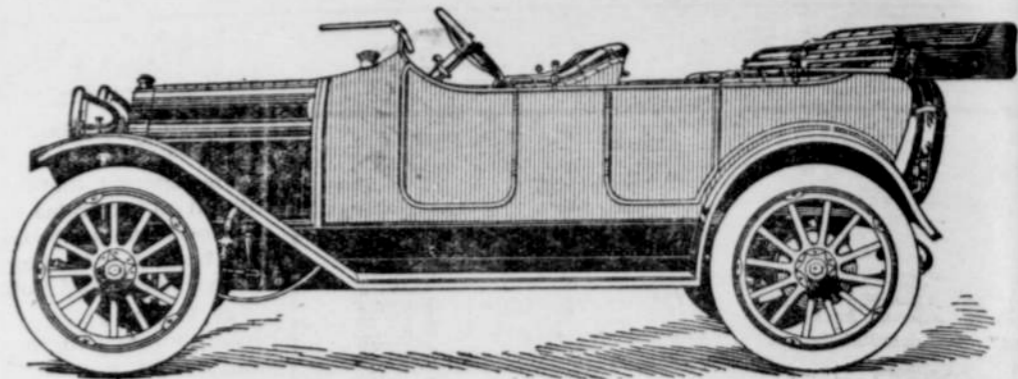
By the arrangement made by the Marine Hospital Service to give Dr. Friedmann's serum a thorough test under his own direction in Bullevue Hospital, there is given the German scientist the best possible opportunity to prove the value of his remedy, and to confirm or destroy the hopes of thousands of victims of the dread disease.

If the Greeks and Servians are sending transports loaded with troops without the escort of warships, and several reports of the sinking or firing upon such transports indicates this to be a fact, ordinary military rules are not being followed. The presence of a Turkish cruiser in the Adriatic or the Aegean, where she can attack troopships, suggests a weakness of the Greek Navy, or of naval strategy, not in harmony with the claims of the allies.

Confirmation of the story told by the escaped brothers of the late President Madero of Mexico about how he was tortured and murdered in cold blood at the palace instead of being shot during an attempted rescue by friends have now reached the American public in the form of a report by agents of the United States Secret Service who were sent to investigate conditions in Mexico.

In a report to the government at Washington these agents, which leaked out to army officers in Texas, they say that the tortures inflicted upon the deposed president and his brother, Gustavo, were worse and more diabolical than those already recounted, indeed, so savage and inhuman as to be unprintable and including the use of a red hot poker. Suarez was likewise the victim of tortures.

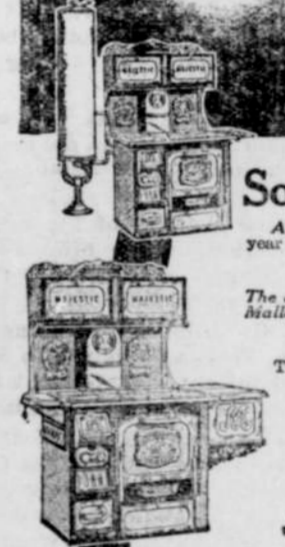
