The receipts at the Tillamook post office for the fiscal year ending March 31, was \$7,357.11. Last year they were \$6,273.79, which is a gain of \$1,083.32. The sale of parcel post stamps at the office since the 1st January was \$112.96. Proposed New Railroad for Tillamook.

C. E. Lytle, who was connected with the building of the P. R. & N., appeared before the Tillamook Commercial Club on Thursday evening and outlined a plan which will give Tillamook County another railroad, and which will be of inestimable benefit to the South part of the county. The proposed railroad will give that valuable section of Tillamook County railroad connections. The plan outlined by Mr. Lytle is to start the road from some point in the Willamette Valley and build to the Slitz country and another branch to Tillamook City. This will open up an extensive territory of country and bring into market vast timber resources. The proposed new railroad, via the south part of the county, would be only five miles longer to Portland than the P. R. & N., but it would have the advantage of better grades, with faster time being made, it being stated that the time between E. S. city and Portland could be covered easily in four hours.

Motion Filed in City Case.

A motion was filed in the case of the Warren Construction Co. vs. Tillamook City, in which the defendants move that the plaintiffs make its complaint more definite and certain in the following particulars:

1st, That it be required to show by its complaint upon what streets or portions of streets the plaintiff has constructed curbs and bitulitic headers and has paved said streets, or portions of streets, in accordance with the contract referred to in the complaint, and upon what portion of said streets the plaintiff has been unable to complete its work on account of weather conditions.

2nd, That plaintiff be required to show in its complaint the particular work done by it which it claims to be finished work, upon that portion of said streets said work was done, and when said work became finished.

The above matters being as to the first cause of action set out in plaintiff's complaint.

That the plaintiff be further required to make its complaint more definite and certain as to the second cause of action set up in its complaint by showing when the sanitary sewer mentioned therein was constructed and installed and when any portion thereof became finished and complete, and when any payment or payments therefor became due under the terms of the contract alleged in the complaint.
