**ANOTHER CASE FILED AGAINST CITY.**  
 Warren Construction Co. Sues For Breach of Contract.

Another suit was filed against the city on Thursday by the Warren Construction Co. on a breach of contract growing out of the city refusing to pay for the sewer system and pavement constructed by the plaintiff. The complaint comprises 53 pages and demands judgment against the defendant for the sum of \$141,276.31 with interest thereon at the rate of 6 per cent per annum from the dates that the sums under the contracts mentioned became due monthly, until paid, and for its costs and disbursements.

The attorneys for the plaintiff are R. W. Montague, John H. McNary, C. W. Huntington and Webster Holmes.

**Bayocean to Pave Four Miles.**  
 The paving of two to four miles of streets is among the improvements to be made at Bayocean this season. Two miles already have been arranged for. This will be laid principally on Bay boulevard and High street. It is expected also to extend the paving on other streets where cottages are located, bringing the total paving for the season to about four miles. Efforts will be made to get the greater part of this work finished and out of the way by July 1, so as not to interfere with the convenience of summer visitors.

### Trask River Literary Society.

Last Saturday night was the last meeting of the Trask River Literary Society for this season. Owing to weather conditions a good many of the members were absent, but a jolly time was had by those present. Everyone seemed bent on making the program a success and a number of excellent recitations and songs were rendered and the newspaper, The Trask River Trumpet, was full of jokes on the members. The question for debate was "Resolved that the Indians of America were treated unfairly by the English." The negative won unanimously. Sergeant At Arms George Ethal then arrested Lewis Nelson who was accused of spitting on the floor. When asked by President Lloyd Kays to come forward and answer to the charge, he said he had to spit, but when the by laws were read to him and he heard that spitting on the floor was a crime subject to a fine, he said he never did it. The case was tried in the Justice Court. Erick Wilson was the attorney for the defense and he questioned the witnesses for the prosecution. Victor Nelson was the first witness called and he testified that while he had not actually seen defendant spit, he was positive he did it. Mr. Hansen then took the stand and his answers corresponded with the first witness. The president took the part of judge and he told defendant he could call any witnesses for his defense if he wished. Arthur Kays was called, who testified that another party was mixed up in it, and not wishing to make another arrest, the witness

was dismissed. Sidney Paul was then called, who testified that he had not seen defendant spit. The attorney for the defense and the sergeant at arms were sent to examine the evidence. When they returned the lawyer for defendant made a plea that there were only some dark stains on the floor which they could not prove to be saliva. The judge then dismissed the case on lack of evidence. This case caused much merriment by the comical questions and answers.  
 The president was called upon to make a speech and he spoke on the benefit this society had been and he hoped the members would take an active part next fall.
