Making Farm Life Attractive

A widespread movement of the day has for its object the popularizing of the idea that the drift of population should be to the soil and not to the cities. To this end the work of demonstration has greatly broadened, and numerous states have seconded the National Agricultural Department in helpfulness for those who want to become producers on the farms, but do not know how to go about it. A little capital soon vanishes when an average city man undertakes to make a living in general agriculture or any of its branches unless he has exceptional knowledge and staying qualities. He needs to be prepared by a study of conditions in their true light. It is quite possible, if he is that sort of person, to accomplish more than he expects, but there is no need of any failure or disappointments when ordinary prudence is consulted and reasonable energy shown.

Farmers already established and classed as successful can see from experiments going on around them, even in the boys' corn clubs, that general labors on the soil are far less productive than they might be. In no nation in the world is it as easy as in the United States to become the owner of available farming land. But it takes definite knowledge to improve the opportunity. Farm demonstrators who are multiplying, and agricultural courses that are widening out, are a practical recognition of the need of instruction to those who can see that farming is the best vocation if rightly comprehended and followed up. Crops in this country per acre might be doubled or trebled. Workers on the soil could be similarly increased if they are wisely guided and master the fundamental principles of how to make farming pay, and insure at the same time an enjoyable life. The farm demonstrators are on the right road to modify an excessive movement of population to the cities.
