Death of Chas. Johnson.

At 12 o'clock Wednesday, April 9, Chas. Johnson, a pioneer of the Nestucca Valley, passed away at the age of 67 years. Death was caused by paralysis and nervous exhaustion. Mr. Johnson had not been feeling in good health for some time and was attacked with paralysis while in one of his buildings near the river Tuesday. He fell backward, receiving a severe scalp wound which rendered him unconscious. He was not found until quite late in the evening. Medical aid was immediately summoned and all that was possible was done for him. He regained consciousness and remained so until his death. Deceased was born in Finland and left there at the age of 24, following the life of a sailor for five years. He came to the Nestucca valley and took up a homestead in 1879, where he since lived until death claimed him. He was buried in Union cemetery yesterday afternoon, Rev. Clark preaching the funeral sermon. He leaves a wife and three children to mourn his death.—Cloverdale Courier.
