The Supreme Court held that the incorporation of Bay City is legal. The high court sustained a decision of Circuit Judge Galloway, of Tillamook County. W. E. Proctor, of Bay City, brought the suit as relator in the name of the state to have determined the legal status of the municipality. The boundary lines in the petitions for the election and those given in the court records were not the same, and it was feared the discrepancy invalidated the election.

The funeral of Mrs. W. B. Honey took place on Friday, the religious service being held in the Presbyterian church, conducted by Rev. D. A. Mackenzie. Delegations from the Ladies' Guild of the church and the Rebecca Lodge followed in the funeral procession from the home to the church. The service was impressively conducted by the pastor and a quartet, and by request of the family Mrs Mackenzie rendered a solo. Beautiful flowers were sent by friends in token of love and respect for the deceased. The interment was in the L.O.O.F. cemetery, where the Rebeckas had charge of the service.

The body of Russell Blackman, secretary of the Fisher Engineering Company, who lost his life at the wreck of the German freighter Mimi, at Nehalem, was found a quarter of a mile north of Cape Mears. The face and body were so badly mutilated by the action of the water that it was impossible to identify by these, but his bank book, issued by the United States National Bank of Portland, and a gold ring on one of the hands, served to establish his identity beyond a doubt. This is the second body found since the wreck of the Mimi, and the two landed at points separated by over 15 miles.

The first damage suit arising from loss of life through the foundering a few weeks ago of the German bark Mimi, while being pulled off the beach at Nehalem Spit, was filed in the Multnomah Circuit Court. The plaintiff is Lulu M. Koen, widow and sole heir of one of the men who lost his life in the disaster. She wants \$50,000. The defendants are the Fisher Engineering Corporation and Watt and Holyfield, who had the contract to float the derelict; J. Westphal, captain of the Mimi, and E. M. Cherry, of Astoria, agent for the Hamburg Assekuratore, a German marine insurance company which is said to have issued a policy of insurance on the bark.

A cement culvert was put in at Pat Smith's, on the road north of the city, which will displace another small bridge. In digging for this culvert, it showed that when the road was first made brush had been used, and the road had been improved so many times since then that on top of this could be seen layers of different kinds of gravel and dirt. From the time the road had first been used there was over five feet of material on top of the brush. It is hard to tell how many times that piece of road was graveled and what it cost the county, but it will give some idea, as well as prove that more than enough money have been expended on some pieces of road than it would cost to hard finish them.

### CURIOUS METHODS

#### Tillamookers Had in Settling Their Debts.

Some time previous to October, 1888 Minny V. Stillwell owed G. W. Blackwell a small amount of money, the exact amount neither of whom knew, but Stillwell gave his note for \$30, and this is how the note was settled, which appeared in the Headlight of Nov. 2, 1888:

STATE OF OREGON, ss.  
County of Tillamook, ss.

I, Geo. W. Blackwell, being first duly sworn, depose and say I am a resident and tax payer of said County and State and an old hand at the business, that I am unmarried, and have no children living to my knowledge, and that I hereby release all my right, title and interest in and to a certain promissory note of an ancient date, given by one Minny V. Stillwell, and made payable to me, said note was for the sum of thirty (\$30) dollars, said note has this date been paid in full, and I hereby acknowledge the receipt of said sum, and warn and abjure any son of a gun from ever trying to collect said note or any portion thereof.

In Testimony Whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 30th day of Oct., 1888, eleven days before Harrison and Norton are to be elected President and Vice President respectively of these United States of America.
