NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN.—A petition has been filed in the County Court of the State of Oregon for Tillamook County a true copy and transcript thereof and of the whole thereof in words, letters and figures as follows: to wit:

1. The County Court of the State of Oregon for Tillamook County.

In the matter of Application of J. J. McCormick for Hotel License, in the Town of Garibaldi, Oregon.

To the Honorable County Court above named: We, the undersigned, your petitioners hereby allege and show to you the following facts and petition you as follows: That we and each of us are residents and legal voters within Garibaldi Precinct, in Tillamook County, Oregon, and have been such for more than thirty days next preceding the date of the signing and filing of this petition, having been, and now are actual residents and legal voters within said Precinct for more than thirty days next preceding 30th day of April, 1913.

That the said J. J. McCormick is the owner of valuable real property in the town of Garibaldi, Oregon, and is the owner and proprietor of a hotel in said town and has been such for more than one year last past, and has heretofore conducted a barroom in said hotel and has at all times conducted a decent and orderly place, and complied with the laws of the State of Oregon with reference to the conducting of said hotel and barroom in connection therewith.

That said hotel will, on the third day of June 1913, accommodate for not less than fifty guests and will have sufficient rooms for the accommodation of at least fifty guests, provided with beds in a suitable manner, and in conformity with the requirements of the statutes of Oregon governing the granting of bars to hotels.

That said McCormick is a competent and suitable person to conduct a hotel with bar in connection therewith.

#### Hearst Causes Surprise.

Another notable attack on the Wilson regime at Washington during week past came from a source hitherto friendly and within the Democratic party. William R. Hearst, owner of nine daily newspapers, in a four column signed editorial, sharply criticizes Wilson on several accounts, but chiefly because of his course in going in person to deliver his message to Congress. The significance of that, Hearst thinks, has been overlooked; that it lies in its revival of federalistic tendencies and a disposition to underestimate our popular form of government with a greater admiration for the British system. Besides insinuating that Wilson's course convicts him of having the weakness of vanity and craving for newspaper notoriety, Hearst recalls the circumstance that Wilson in his essay on taking the doctor's degree contended that the English form of government is superior to the American. Also he cites a statement made by Wilson that he got his news of the world from the weekly issue of the London Times. Finally Hearst charges that Wilson is essentially a free trader of the English sort. Notwithstanding that the proposed placing of paper and cattle on the free list would be a vast benefit to himself (Hearst) in a business way, owing to his cattle ranches in Texas and his many newspaper properties, still he sternly repels those changes as un-American unless along with them were secured reciprocal favors from other nations.

#### Help The Children to Help Themselves.

In every town and city there are many vacant lots growing up to weeds that might just as well be producing garden and flowers, thus adding beauty and utility to the city instead of being an eyesore. Many of these lots are owned by non residents and others who would be glad to donate the use of them to the children. Almost every town or community has its Parent-Teachers' Circle, civic board and perhaps other organizations, and they and the school board should get together and from their membership appoint a committee, whose duty it shall be to secure the use of them for the children and arrange to have them plowed and fenced, when necessary. In appointing these committees do not overlook the ladies, for in our experience we have found them adepts at such work. It would also be their duty to plan and manage the local contests, provide prizes for same and to select exhibits to be forwarded to the State Fair, and to show the children how to pack, mark, enter

and ship them. The teacher is not always qualified to do this work, and has about all he can do beside. Then when school closes and perhaps the teacher leaves the town the children need help and encouragement which this committee can give.

In every town and city are many children who have little or nothing to do outside of school hours. No healthy child can be idle, and without some direction of his activities and some provision of a proper avenue through which to vent them, they are apt to be wasted. It is not so much the fault of these children if they get into mischief and form habits of idleness, and possibly viciousness, as it is the fault of parents, guardians and others for not providing interesting and profitable employment for them. To aid in providing this employment and making it attractive and profitable is the object of the industrial contest movement inaugurated last year. To make this a perfect success it must have the co-operation of parents, teachers, school boards and all public spirited citizens, and we know of no better way in which they can help than as above suggested. Try it. Let the teacher or president of the Parent-Teacher's Circle call a meeting at once, effect an organization and report to the office of Superintendent of Public Instruction, Salem, Oregon, in order that he can put you on his mailing list for bulletins, etc., and assist you in every way possible.

Add 2 lbs. of sulphate of zinc (white vitrol) dissolved in water. Add water enough to bring all to the consistency of thick whitewash.
