The County Court took up the petition of the citizens at Wheeler to call a special election to incorporate that town, which was granted and the election will be held on the 29th.

The mail service on the P. R. & N. will in future be seven days instead of six days a week on all points on the road, it having been decided to place mail clerks on the Sunday trains next Sunday.

At a meeting of the city council on Monday a resolution was passed authorizing the improvement of more side walks. Mayor Harter was granted a continuance of leave of absence until the 15th June.

William Maxwell will leave Monday to attend the State Grange and he will carry an invitation from the Tillamook Commercial Club for the Grange to hold its next annual meeting in 1914 in Tillamook.

Morrison Mills returned last week, having gone to a stock sale at the West stock farm at Scappoose, where he purchased a full blood Jersey cow and heifer. Mr. Mills was delighted with the stock he saw at the stock farm.

Machinery for the whey sugar factory to be erected near the Maple Leaf Cheese Factory has been shipped. Mr. Warner obtained contracts for 95 per cent of the whey from Maple Leaf and it is the intention of the factory to sign up.

Frank A. Rowe was in the city on Wednesday. He is the promoter of the new town of Wheeler on the south side of Nehalem bay, and he extended an invitation to the editors of the county to visit that growing section of the county, promising to dine and wine them.

It is expected that the new bridge north of town will be finished on Saturday so that travel can be resumed on that road. The contractors, took advantage of the fine weather and carted a large amount of dirt, fixing it so that the road roller can be used.

Prof. W. J. Kerr, president of the Oregon Agricultural College, and E. Shrock, deputy dairy and food commissioner, will discuss the matter of a demonstration farm for this county at the Court House, on Monday afternoon, at 1 p.m., when a large attendance of dairymen is expected to be present.

The new auto truck belonging to the Commercial Stables was put on the run between this city and Cloverdale on Tuesday, carrying the mail. As soon as the summer schedule on the railroad goes into effect, it is probable that the schedule on the South mail route will be changed so as to make the return trip the same evening.

General Passenger Agent J. M. Scott, of the Southern Pacific, is expected in to make final arrangements for the summer schedule on the P. R. & N. Besides the local train between Tillamook City and Mohler, it is expected that two trains will leave this city for Portland as soon as the summer travel opens up.

Married, on Saturday, at Cloverdale, by the Rev. S. L. Clark, pastor of the Cloverdale Presbyterian Church, W. Carl Commons and Miss Hazel Scherzinger. The happy couple are well known and popular young people of the south part of the county, and their many friends extend to them their congratulations and best wishes for their future happiness.

J. J. Hollett was in the city attending the meeting of the county court in regard to improving the road to Blaine. The enterprising settlers in that part of the county have done considerable volunteer work and now that the court has permanently located the road it will be graded, and probably next year

the court will put the rock crushing plant there and give Blaine a good graded road, which it is entitled to.

Following the dedicatory services at the Christian Church, Evangelist Gaylor, assisted by C. H. Altheide, will commence a series of revival meetings in the new church building on Sunday.

Attorney M. J. Gersoni has opened a law office in the offices occupied by Attorney Holmes in the Tillamook Block. He will devote two days, Saturday and Sunday to Nehalem. Mr. Gersoni has been appointed county attorney, but there is some probability that this law will be referred to the people, in which event, Attorney T. B. Handley will continue to act as deputy assistant prosecuting attorney.

State Dairy and Food Commissioner J. D. Mickle, writes: "All dairy butter offered or exposed for sale will be considered misbranded if it does not have plainly marked on each roll or square the words, 'Dairy Butter,' '16 ounces full weight,' or '32 ounces full weight,' and the name and address of the manufacturer. Any person offering or exposing for sale dairy butter not branded in compliance with this ruling will be prosecuted under the statutes provided for the branding of food products.

There was no clothing except a blue shirt. The opinion expressed by those who saw the body was that the man was about 35 years old, had weighed 175 pounds and was five feet, ten inches tall. Coroner Hawk summoned a jury, and from the fact that the grave was quite shallow deduced there had been foul play, and returned a verdict in accordance therewith.

The weather the past week was beautifully fine, and considerable progress was made in some of the improvements which are going on in this progressive city. The buildings having been removed from the Oddfellows' property, the basement is being excavated for another two-story building which will be another permanent improvement to the city. The Oddfellows have been fortunate in renting the whole of the stores and offices before work is even commenced on the building. On the ground floor the First National Bank, will occupy the corner, and Arthur Stillwell and the City Transfer Co. will occupy the other two stores.

There appears to be a general sentiment in favor of a stock show in Tillamook City this summer, and from the look of things this will soon be decided upon. There is no reason why this should not be an annual affair and a creditable showing made of blooded stock. We feel sure if the dairymen will take a lively interest in a stock show it will not only be a success, but will stimulate the desire to obtain the best grades of cattle. It may be a good opportunity to decide this at the meeting next Monday at the Court House, when President Kerr, of the Oregon Agricultural College, will address the dairymen on the question of demonstration farms.

A special meeting of the Tillamook Commercial Club was held on Wednesday evening, with a good attendance of members to take into consideration the matter of club rooms. Several suggestions were offered, one of which was to incorporate and for the club to build and own its own quarter, but as the present quarters were offered for \$650 a year it was agreed to rent these for the coming year. Several other matters were taken up and referred to different committees, one of which was to hold a strawberry social and dance next month to help defray some of the indebtedness of the club, it being the intention of the newly elected officers to wipe this off as quickly as possible.
