Boosters Go To Cloverdale.

M. S. Shrock, deputy dairy and food commissioner; Chas. Kunze, president of the Tillamook Dairy Association; J. H. Dunstan, of the Fairview Grange; Fred C. Baker, president of the Tillamook Commercial Club; and C. I. Clough will leave Friday to attend a meeting at Cloverdale on Saturday for the purpose of getting the dairymen of the South part of the county interested in a demonstration farm and a stock show. It is hoped that there will be a large attendance of dairymen and Grangers to hear Mr. Shrock, and as there is a spirit of get together and pull together, for the purpose of developing the entire county and apply scientific methods to dairying, great results are expected. It was at the suggestion of some of the members of the Tillamook Commercial Club that this meeting was called at Cloverdale where there is a Grange meeting Saturday.

Stock Show Committees.

At a special meeting of the Fairview Grange on Saturday afternoon a committee was appointed, composed of William Maxwell, Morrison Mills and Marion Chance, to plan for a stock show in conjunction with a committee from the Tillamook Commercial Club. Upon receiving word to that effect, the president appointed Will Spalding, Ira C. Smith and C. I. Clough as the committee from the Commercial Club. As Mr. Maxwell is attending the State Grange a meeting cannot be held until next week, unless the Grangers' committee desire a meeting before that time, when J. H. Wheeler Has \$8,000 Fire.

WHEELER, Ore., May 12.—Fire in the dry kiln of the Wheeler Lumber Company's plant tonight destroyed two kilns at a loss of \$8000 and to lumber \$500. By hard work on the part of a bucket brigade, worked by 200 men and two firepumps the planers' shed, the dry shed and mill were saved. The fire broke out at 9 o'clock, but was not under control till 11 o'clock. The dry kiln destroyed had a daily capacity of 4200. Combustion is supposed to have been the cause of the conflagration, the largest Wheeler has experienced for some time.

CHURCH DEDICATED.

A Large Sum of Money was Raise to Pay Off Debt.

There was a large congregation at the new Christian Church on Sunday morning, to participate in the dedication of that handsome and commodious church building, the other church dispensing with their morning services to take part. Much, however, to the disappointment of visitors who attended the morning service to hear the dedicatory sermon, the program was changed, and instead of an impressive service it was turned into a stunt to raise money, with a whole raft of funny anecdotes which caused considerable laughter and amusement.

The service was opened with several hymns by the large choir and responsive reading and prayer by Evangelist Gaylor. C. H. Altheide rendered a beautiful vocal solo with good effect.

Rev. S. R. Hawkins, of Portland, proved himself an expert in inducing people to sign notes for large and small sums of money to defray the indebtedness on the church. In his opening remarks he highly complimented the congregation for erecting such a splendid, commodious building, which was a credit to them and the city. He could hardly believe that such a structure could be built for \$20,000, for his church in Portland had cost \$80,000 and it was no better. He was pleased with the location, and thought the committee which had selected the site was

deserving of a vote of thanks, for the church was nicely situated between the business portion and the depot. He was pleased with the architecture and the general arrangements and the basement of the building, all of which reflected great credit upon those who had anything to do with the building of the church, especially commending Rev. R. E. Jope, the pastor, and Wm. Roy, who had charge of the work. The rev. gentleman then stated that it was necessary to raise \$10,000 that morning, and when that was done the church could borrow \$4,000 from the board. He said the church could not be dedicated until the indebtedness was provided for, when he made an appeal for money, which lasted nearly two hours, and resulted in a little over \$11,600 being raised on promissory notes, to be paid in three years.
