

DEMONSTRATION FARM DISCUSSION.

Interesting Meeting and Committee Appointed.

There was a good attendance at the Court House on Monday afternoon to hear discussed the matter of a demonstration farm for Tillamook County, some of the dairymen coming from Nehalem for the purpose of attending the meeting.

Owing to the unavoidable absence of President Kerr, of the Oregon Agricultural College, whose wife was taken seriously sick, Prof. R. D. Hetzel took his place, with M. S. Shrock, deputy dairy and food commissioner.

President Chas. Kunze, of the Tillamook Development Association, opened the proceedings with a few appropriate remarks touching upon the benefits which would be derived from organizing a demonstration farm, both socially and financially.

Prof. Hetzel commenced his remarks by a review of what had been done in other parts of the country by the cooperating with different State Agricultural Colleges, in referring to what had first been done in the Southern States to eliminate the boll weevil which was destroying the cotton crop.

He suggested an average size farm, with partly bottom and partly prairie land. The financial end would be in the hands of the County Court and the management under the supervision of the State Agricultural College.

On motion it was decided to elect a committee, with the president to act on it.

The committee is Chas. Kunze, George Williams, George McKimins, C. Randall and W. E. Noyes.

Monday evening a number of dairymen and business men met at the Commercial Club rooms, when Messrs. Hetzel and Shrock spoke, after which a general discussion took place in regard to the demonstration farm and other matters.

The committee which had been appointed held a meeting and decided to confer with the County Court.

COMMISSIONERS' COURT PROCEEDINGS.

Court convened Wednesday the 17th of May, 1913, at 9 o'clock a. m., with the following officers present: The Hon. Homer Mason, Judge; H. M. Farmer, Commissioner; Geo. R. Edner, Commissioner; J. C. Holden, Clerk; H. Crenshaw, Sheriff.

In the matter of the incorporation of the town of Wheeler, petition is granted, and Thursday, the 29th day of May, is the date set for the holding of the first city election.

In the matter of the "W. S. Cone Road" leading from Bay City to the Miami bridge, and damages claimed by E. C. Robinson, M. F. Robinson and F. C. Robinson, to the amount of \$175.00; the Robinsons withdraw claims upon consideration that certain improvements are made in connection with the construction of the road.

In the matter of the county road surveyed over the lands of Wright Blodgett Company, Limited, in Township 2 north, range 10 west, W. M., company waives all claims for damages provided County pays \$2.00 per thousand feet for all merchantable timber upon right of way and four cents per ton for all of the rock suitable for road construction which shall be taken from the lands of said company from the ledge over which said road is to pass, and will further grant to said company a right of way across road for constructing a logging railroad.

In the matter of the petition of W. A. McKinster for a gateway from his residence to the county road in township 5 south of range 10 west, W. M., it is ordered that U. G. Jackson, Frank Owens and C. C. Jensen be appointed as board of viewers, and meet at Ore-town school house on the 21st day of May, and proceed to view out and locate such a gateway.

In the matter of the petition of N. E. Reynolds and others for the county road, same is rejected.

In the matter of a contract between Tillamook County and the Coast Bridge Company, for bridge at the "Tom Jenkin's Ranch" on Wilson River, to be delivered on or before May 25th, for the sum of \$5,400, same is hereby approved and entered into.

In the matter of the approval of the plat of "Bright Waters," situated in sections 19 and 30, T. 3 S., R. 10 W. of W. M., same is approved.

In the matter of the petition of A. J. Mapes et al for a county road: It appearing from report that the lands of the following named persons will not be rendered less valuable by the location of said proposed road; and it further appearing that the following named persons, viz: Chas. Kunze, Jacob Pesterfield, T. J. McCormack, E. W. Knight, E. E. Cross, Homer Cross, Bertha Hunt, M. A. Wheeler and T. J. Harris, Jr., have filed petitions for damages by reason of the location of said proposed road in the sums set opposite their respective names, to-wit: M. A. Wheeler \$880.00, Homer M. DISAPPEARING GUNS.

Ease With Which These Coast Defenses Monsters Are Coated.

Three kinds of big guns are used on the coasts to defend us from hostile invaders. When a gun is fired over an embankment or parapet it is called a barbette. The earliest guns were of this order. The parapets were notched so that the firing could be done over their top. When the gun is discharged through a port or hole in the embankment it is called a casemate. The newest kind of heavy artillery is the disappearing gun, which drops back behind its wall as soon as it is discharged.

The man who aims the gun has a little platform to one side of the machine. Things are arranged so that he can control all operations of the gun from where he stands. Electricity is used for bringing the gun up and getting it into position, and all the mechanism can be regulated by the gunner. So wonderfully is the big machine under control that it cannot be fired by any person whomsoever unless it is raised up and in firing position. When it is not in firing position it is called "out of battery."

The Fastest Growing Tree.

Hard, fine grained, durable wood usually grows slowly. A most remarkable exception is the eucalyptus, and this it is that gives the tree its great value as a means of reforestation. It is said that the eucalyptus grows five times as rapidly as any other tree. Seedlings have been observed to make an average growth of six inches in height a day, and one tree in California attained a height of 125 feet and a diameter of thirty-six inches in nine years. The eucalyptus will not thrive where there are frosts, but in the south it promises to go a long way toward filling the place once occupied by other hardwoods, which have been greatly reduced by demands for furniture, carriage and cooperage stock.—Harper's.
