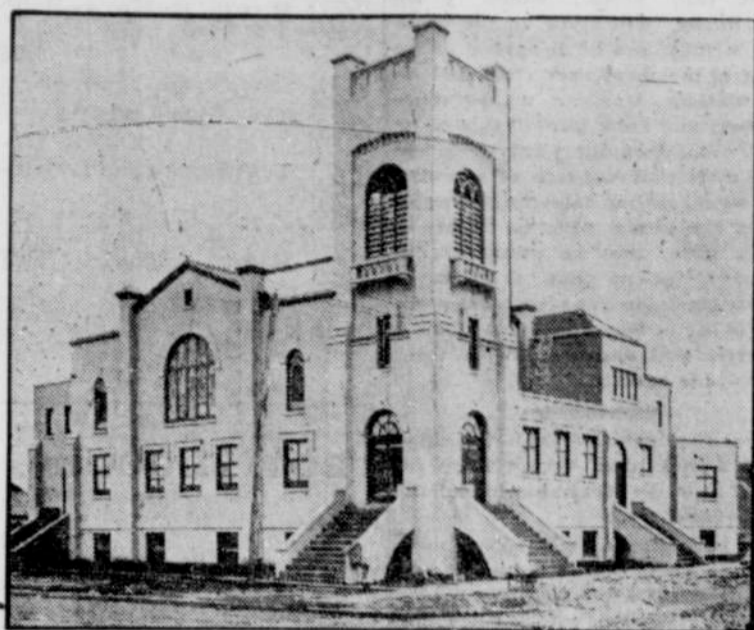

Deputy Dairy and Food Commissioner M. S. Shrock examined the dairy ranches of those who are retailing milk in this city, and made the following report:

W. A. Eberman—Needs water in milk house. Needs cooler. Must not haul kitchen slop or offal and junk in on milk wagon. Needs windows in barn and screen doors on milk house.

W. D. Gladwell—Very good dairy. Strainer is rusty, otherwise everything about the dairy is in good order. Milk purchased from wagon tested 4.2 per cent, cream 27.6.

Jim Tone—Very good dairy. Cows are clean. Needs better facilities for hot water or steam in milk house. Milk purchased from wagon tested 4.9 per cent, cream 25.3.

A. B. Hammond, of the Hammond Lumber Co., was in the city on Tuesday. Mr. Hammond built the Astoria railroad, and this is the first time he has visited this city. His company paid \$36,421.87 in taxes this year. Mr. Hammond came

in with the Southern Pacific officials. He was not particularly impressed with the P. R. & N. road, and thought it would take considerable money to maintain it.
