State of Oregon: Section 1. The several counties in this state are hereby authorized hold county agricultural fairs. The county court of each county may appoint a board consisting of three resident taxpaying citizens of the county, to be known as the ..... County Fair Board. The

members of said board shall be recommended by the agricultural and horticultural societies and granges of the county, and shall be appointed for a term of three years; provided, that when the first board of directors are appointed under this act one director shall appointed for one year, one for two years, and one for three years. And annually thereffer one direct-or shall be appointed to serve for

three years.
The Court shall require each member of the board to furnish a good and sufficient bond in favor of the county in a sum not less than the amount of the annual appropriation received from the State for the support of the fair, conditioned up-on the faithful performance of the duties of his office. 
