F. D. Small won his suit in the Circuit Court of Multnomah County against Malarkey Fish Co., for fish shipped that firm, the jury awarding \$275.18. The witnesses for the defendant contradicted one another so badly that they won the case for Small.

He had a hearing before Justice Stanley, who fined him \$30, again suspending sentence to give him an opportunity to provide for his wife and family, as the justice did not think it a very serious case of assault.

At a meeting of the city council on Monday evening it was decided to continue the cement sidewalk question until the next meeting.

A resolution was passed to employ W. R. Roy as city inspector at \$10 a day. The city council also decided to purchase a flusher for the streets, the company deciding to take back the street sweeper at the same price that was paid for it.

The editor's bungalow had a close call of being destroyed by fire on Friday afternoon. Several sparks from the chimney, during the strong northwest wind in the afternoon, caught the roof on fire in several places, burning completely through the shingles before it was noticed by Mr. and Mrs. Emmett Bales, who were passing in their auto, when several teamsters tore off the burning shingles. Some of the official members of the Methodist, Presbyterian and United Brethren churches have under consideration the advisability of formulating a plan so that these congregations can worship together in one church. The question of church property is a complex question for it seems, that this is vested in the different district organizations. It is proposed to build a new modern church suitable for such a congregation.

The adjourned term of the Circuit was set for last Monday, but owing to some mix up with filing new papers and the change of judges for the new district, court was not called on Monday to try the case where the citizens have an injunction suit against the Warren Construction Co. Judge Webster Holmes has called a special term of the Circuit Court for June 23rd, and he has requested the Chief Justice to appoint a judge to try the pavement cases.

The new train service on the P. R. & N. will go into effect about the 23rd June, when extra trains will be run from Portland and Tillamook City, leaving about one o'clock. Two observation cars have been ordered for these trains, but they may not be ready when the new schedule goes into effect. These trains will not handle mail unless it is decided to have through pouches between the two cities. There would be only a small amount of mail as there is only a few hours difference in the time of the trains leaving Portland.

Mrs. Percy gave a most interesting talk on Mexico at the home of Mr. and Mrs. F. S. Whitehouse on Friday evening. Having resided in that country for a number of years she is thoroughly familiar with conditions there, both socially and politically. She dwelt upon the different characteristics of the Mexicans, their treachery, musical ability, and their horror of taking baths. Mrs. Percy says it is a splendid country, and with a staple form of government it has a great future. She looks for another revolution of a desperate character in the near future. She, like a large number of our citizens, believes that the United States should annex Mexico.

It has been decided by the committees of the Fairview Grange and the Tillamook Commercial Club having in charge the organization of the Tillamook County Fair Association to form a permanent organization on the 21st of this month. Most of the stock thus far subscribed was in this city, and as the dairymen have not been given an opportunity to subscribe, it is hoped that they will take more interest in seeing that a large proportion of the stock is distributed to a large extent amongst the dairymen, who should have the management and control of the organization. Anyone subscribing one dollar will have a voice in the affairs of the association, and it is hoped that all the dairymen of the county will take enough interest in the association to take one share.

General W. E. Finzer, of the Oregon National Guard, and Major F. C. Endicott, of the U. S. Army, came in from Portland on Tuesday to see what could be done to accommodate the National Guard in their annual encampment this year. They were met at the depot by a delegation from the Tillamook Commercial Club, and were taken to two suitable locations, one to the west and the other to the east of town. In the evening they were at the club rooms and discussed the matter the club agreeing to provide water on the camp grounds and take in hand what other matters have to be attended to. The regiment will be about 700 strong, and should Tillamook be selected they will arrive here on the 8th July in three trains, remaining eight days. To Prevent Disease Amongst Animals and Fowls.

The new law affecting diseases amongst animals and fowls went into effect on Tuesday. The aim and object of the new law is to prevent the spread of tuberculosis and contagious diseases in stock and other animals, dealing specially with tuberculosis in dairy herds. A commission will have charge of the work and a State Veterinarian and deputies will be appointed to enforce the law. When dairy animals are ordered killed it is necessary to comply with certain condition to obtain part compensation for the loss of the animals. The law allows \$10.00 for each heifer over one year and under two years of age; and \$25 for each cow two years of age or over; and fifty per cent additional on each heifer or cow registered in any registry of blooded stock recognized by the Bureau of Animal Industry of the United States; and for a registered bull the same amount as for a registered cow. One half of said amount allowed as indemnity, shall be paid upon order of the county court out of the general funds of the county. The county court shall transmit to the Secretary of State a certified copy of its findings as to the amount of indemnity payable to the claimant and the Secretary of State shall then issue his warrant upon the state treasurer, in favor of the claimant, for the remaining one-half of the indemnity allowed, which shall be paid out of the moneys appropriated under this act.

Another provision of the law states that: "It shall be the duty of the State Veterinarian or his deputy to investigate all cases or suspected cases of infectious, contagious, or communicable diseases in any domestic animals or fowls in this state, and to make official visits to any locality where he has reason to believe such disease exists; he shall possess authority to order and compel the destruction of any animal affected with any dangerous or incurable infectious, contagious, or communicable disease, and to order the disposal of the carcass in such manner as will prevent the further spread of the disease."

Appointments by Governor.

SALEM, OR., June 3.—Donald H. Upjohn, of Dallas, but until May 1 a newspaper man of Salem, today was appointed by Governor West district attorney of the Twelfth Judicial District, created by an act passed at the last session of the Legislature. The law became effective at midnight, and Mr. Upjohn began his new work this morning.

The district comprises Polk, Yamhill and Tillamook Counties.

which formerly were embraced in the Third Judicial District. The district attorney will receive a salary of \$1800 a year and will have three deputies at a salary of \$400 each annually.

Mr. Upjohn was scheduled to become county attorney of Polk County under the county attorney bill, which will be referred to the people in November. As a result, the act creating the new judicial district supersedes the county attorney act. Should the people approve the bill Mr. Upjohn probably would be appointed county attorney of Polk County, in accordance with the original programme. Soon after giving up his newspaper work in Salem early in May, Mr. Upjohn moved to Dallas. He was graduated from the law department of the Willamette University about one year ago. Mr. Upjohn is a Republican.
