Harry Sutor, the former Coast League Star, will join the Tillamook Club this week and will probably pitch Sunday's game.

The Port of Bay City expects to receive the bonds from the East either the end of the week or the commencement of next, which will complete that part of the transaction. This will be followed by work being started on the jetty and as this is a most important undertaking and means much to this city and Tillamook bay it will soon cause the United Railways and the big lumber interests to get busy with their plans for future development of this part of the country.

On Sunday morning the Baccalaureate sermon was preached at the Christian Church to the graduating class of the High School by the Rev. D. A. Mackenzie, pastor of the Presbyterian Church. His subject was, "The Price of Success," was eloquently delivered, being one of the best sermons ever delivered in this city. The New U.B. Pastor.

H. F. White, the new pastor appointed to fill the United Brethren pulpit, comes direct from Dayton, Ohio, where he has just completed the course in the Bonebrake Theological Seminary. He had already finished the regular college course in Philomath College. But for a young man he also comes equipped with considerable experience in the pastorate having been four years consecutively pastor at The Dalles. He was quite young when filling his first pastorate at Beaver and Pleasant Valley.

But we feel that it should be his best equipment is that of the heart, spiritual sensitiveness and discernment along with a close personal acquaintance with the Savior of men.

Mole and Gopher Law.

The last session of the state legislature passed a law allowing a bounty upon gophers and moles in Tillamook County, the law being as follows:

Section 1. The County Court of Tillamook County, Oregon, is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to levy a tax not to exceed one-tenth of one mill on a dollar of the assessed valuation of the taxable and assessable property in said county, each year, for the payment of bounties upon gophers and moles taken and killed in said county.

Section 2. The funds derived from said tax shall be placed in a special fund known as the Gopher and Mole Bounty Fund, and the County Clerk of said Tillamook County shall pay as a bounty for

every scalp of every mole or gopher produced and examined at this office by drawing a warrant against the special fund created by this act, at the rate of 25 cents for each and every scalp. Thereafter said scalp shall be destroyed by said clerk.

Section 3. During the year 1913 said warrants may be paid out of the general fund of said county, and during the year 1914, said general fund shall be reimbursed out of said special fund in this act provided for, and thereafter out of said special fund exclusively.

Section 4. At any time there is a surplus at the end of any year, of the funds in said special funds the County Court may transfer any part of said surplus to the general fund of said county.

Bounties on 210 gophers and moles have been paid for by County Clerk Holden. Elizabeth Balmer was paid \$20 for 80; John Stuvenga \$12 for 48; Alva Wells \$9 for 36. Jim Fitzpatrick, for a boy, is making good wages, bringing in four every day.

To Water Consumers.
