**As the Community so the Newspaper.**

It is an old and trite saying, though very true, that you can tell what a community is by the newspaper. That this is very generally believed is proven by the number of requests received for sample copies of the Tidings. Nearly every one who contemplates moving to a strange community sends for a copy of the local newspaper. As is the newspaper, so is their conception of the town and it is a true judgment.

What the newspaper is, depends largely upon the man behind the pen—not only in writing copy but in signing checks—but it depends even more on the citizens of the town at large. The man at the helm cannot do his best if cramped in his efforts by a meagre, grudging or domineering support. He might be able to furnish a sheet which might do credit to the town if he had hearty enthusiastic support. On the other hand, if the man is not big enough calibre for the town, he does not stay long. The paper outgrows him. Some man comes along who knows the game better and sees greater possibilities in the sheet and the back number is laid upon the shelf.

The value of the newspaper to the town is not confined by any means to the impression sent abroad, but here lies one of the reasons why every firm in every city should be represented by an advertisement in every issue of the home paper. The man outside of the city who is desirous of securing a location is sure to look over the paper. If his line is not represented in the advertisements, his first thought is that the line is not represented, or if it is, the representative is a "dead one" and the first thing the local man knows he has the competition of a "live wire" when if he had been alive himself and let the world know that he was alive he would not have had an additional competitor.

This is but one of the many reasons why an advertisement, even if the sales growing from it cannot be pinned down as a valuable asset for any and every business man.

The newcomer in a community invariably turns to the newspaper when in search of services or information along any line. If your name is there the chances are good

that you will get his business.

The newspaper is not only the standing advertisement of the town but it is the medium and the only medium through which you can learn, with reasonable exactness and impartiality the doings of your neighbors. If you are away from home it is the local paper more than to the letters of friends and relatives that you look for news of your friends and neighbors and for the business index of the entire community.

These are but a few of the reasons why it is a matter of profit in dollars and cents as well as an intangible means to give the home paper a support, financially and morally, which will enable it to be an exponent of the town of which the town may well be proud.

The support given a newspaper should not be domineering, or with a string to it, if the paper is to prove of benefit to the town. Probably the editor's ideas do not exactly coincide with yours. It would be remarkable if they did on all things. Then why insist that he must voice your ideas if he is honest, alert for the upbuilding of the town, even if along somewhat different lines than your judgment deems the best, the paper is worthy of your support.

You do not turn your back on a man and refuse to work with him in church because his political beliefs do not agree with yours. Neither should you refuse to work with and support a paper on lines on which you agree because you do not approve of the policy of the paper on some other lines. Financial support conditioned upon subservience of the paper to your ideas on matters of public or private policy is of little value to a paper and often hinders rather than helps the paper to be a success either financially or as a factor in the upbuilding of the town. It almost partakes of the nature of a bribe and debasest both him who gives and the paper which receives. A paper deserves support because it returns dollar for dollar for all paid it to the community. You never heard of a newspaper man getting rich enough to retire in a small city, and all that he makes goes back to the community either directly or indirectly.—Ashland Tidings.

**Notice Closing Streams.**

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS, That, WHEREAS, the State Board of Fish and Game Commissioners, of the State of Oregon (as well as its predecessors, the Board of Fish Commissioners of the State of Oregon) has propagated and stocked, and is propagating and stocking the waters of Tillamook Bay and its tributaries, in Tillamook County, State of Oregon, with salmon fish, and

WHEREAS, said Tillamook Bay and its tributaries are frequented by salmon fish, and, for the purpose of protecting the same, the said State Board of Fish and Game Commissioners have decided to close a tributary of said Tillamook Bay, known as the Hoquarton Slough, and its tributaries above a point on said Hoquarton Slough, 47 deg. 31 minutes West 2,013.7 feet from the section corner common to Sections 23, 24, 25 and 26, of Township 1 South, Range 10 West, of the Willamette Meridian—this point on said Hoquarton Slough being more particularly designated by posts erected by the Master Fish Warden warning the public; and also another tributary of said Tillamook Bay, known as Miami River, above a point where the county wagon bridge crosses said Miami River just below the Pacific Railway & Navigation Company's railroad bridge crossing said Miami River, all being in Tillamook County, State of Oregon, to prevent fishing therein by any means whatever, except with hook and line, commonly called angling, for salmon fish, during the periods of time hereafter specified.

NOW, THEREFORE, NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN by the State Board of Fish and Game Commissioners that said tributary of Tillamook Bay, known as Hoquarton Slough and its tributaries above a point on said Hoquarton Slough 47 deg. 31 minutes West 2,013.7 feet from the section corner common to Sections 23, 24, 25 and 26, of Township 1 South, Range 10 West, of the Willamette Meridian—this point on said Hoquarton Slough being more particularly designated by posts erected by the Master Fish Warden warning the public, are and each of them is hereby closed to fishing of any kind for salmon fish, except with hook and line, commonly called angling, from and after July 17, 1913, until on and after October 15, 1913; and that the tributary of said Tillamook Bay, known as Miami River, above a point where the county wagon bridge crosses said Miami River just below the Pacific Railway & Navigation Company's railroad bridge crossing said Miami River, is hereby closed to fishing of any kind for salmon fish, except with hook and line, commonly called angling, from and after July 17th, 1913, until said tributary is opened again to salmon fishing, as provided for under Section 5316 of Lord's Oregon Laws; and it is and will be unlawful to fish for, or take, or catch any salmon fish by any means whatever, except with hook and line, commonly called angling, in any of said waters during the said periods of time above specified.

Any and all persons whomsoever so fishing in violation of this notice will be prosecuted as by law provided.
