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Pointed Remarks.

Senator Ransdell of Louisiana says there is a free-sugar lobby in Washington. The planters of that state know that their industry has always been persistently attacked from the free-trade side.

Mr. Carnegie says the American banking system is the worst in the world and yet it is identified with the period in which the United States became the wealthiest of nations.

Stockmen deny the accuracy of the Department of Agriculture figures as to the decrease in the number of beef cattle in the United States the past five years, but they do not deny the fact of a large decrease, which is the vital thing. There are millions less cattle, and millions more mouths demanding meat. The combination is not one which promises cheaper living.

In his testimony before the Senate committee, Mr. Charles F. Wennecker sounded the right note when he said: "The higher the wage the better we would like it. If the wage would be doubled all over the country I would be pleased. We would get better and cleaner work and nicer girls." This means the farther away our industries get from sweat-shop conditions the better it is for everybody, better for the workers, who could live more decently, for the employers, who would get better work and for the consumers, who would get better and more healthful goods.

Japan's rejoinder to the note of the United States answering the Japanese protest against the Webb law of California is said to be of a tone to impress official Washington agreeably. Yet it is understood to maintain the contention that the California law is in contravention of the United States-Japanese treaty of 1911, and to go much farther, in the raising of an issue between the two governments, by insisting that legislation in California, Arizona and other states is so manifestly directed at the Japanese residents of such states that the Tokio ministry is under the necessity of insisting that the existing racial barriers to the naturalization of Japanese in this country be removed. The Japanese Government shall constitute suit in a United States court to determine the treaty rights of its subjects here is not accepted, and it is urged, in reply, that it is incumbent upon the Government of the United States to bring such an action, or to take some other action which will give to Japanese residents in this country the rights to which they are entitled by treaty.

Several Democratic senators say they are not in favor of free trade, but that they will support their party rather than vote their convictions. If business questions could be settled by a party caucus the responsibilities of trade would be lighter. But merchants and manufacturers find their problems of a different nature.

While the Missouri mule is the proud boast of Missouri Democratic leaders, who have taken him into their politics without his consent, we have always suspected that should a straight issue in politics ever arise between the mule and the Democratic donkey, the mule would be repudiated. The deed was done by that leader of the untiered Democracy in Missouri, Senator James A. Reed, testifying in the senatorial quiz, as to any experience he has had, in official connections or relations, with any lobby, or lobbyists at work to influence tariff legislation, he told the Senate committee that he had received a number of letters and telegrams from horse and mule dealers in St. Louis, saying: "Please, vote for a duty on sugar. It is necessary to preserve the mule industry of Missouri." The senator declared this is to be a lobby attempt coming within the president's definition of being "insidious." "It is plain to me that sugar planters were seeking to influence the men from whom they bought mules," he said, and then proceeded to characterize such methods of influencing the action of Congress as lobbying.

tion 5316 of Lord's Oregon Laws; and it is and will be unlawful to fish for, or take, or catch any salmon fish by any means whatever, except with hook and line, commonly called angling, in any of said waters during the said periods of time above specified. Any and all persons whomsoever so fishing in violation of this notice will be prosecuted as by law provided.
