ber of the canneries will not start up this season owing to such a large amount of last season's pack being unsold, and as the revenue of his department came mostly from money derived from licenses to fishermen and canneries, it will greatly reduce the income should there be a shut down of canneries. Mr. Clanton will want three or four acres of land for the hatchery on the Wilson river, and if this can be obtained free or at any reasonable figure, it is probable that the new hatchery will be erected there and the place fixed up so that it will be an attractive place for visitors.
