A large quantity of furniture for the new hotel have arrived in this city and the bed rooms are being fixed up as speedily as possible so as to be ready when the Moose excursion arrives here on Saturday.

A fire alarm was turned in this morning, the stove in the restaurant in Clement's building having caught the wood work on fire. The boys promptly responded and it took but a few seconds to extinguish it.

As the Western Union's telegraph office is established at the depot, a petition was forwarded to Manager Robb to have an office established in the business district of the city, and this was referred to the Superintendent.

A special meeting of the stockholders of the Maple Leaf Creamery Association will be held on Saturday at the factory for the purpose of considering the matter of disposing

ing of the whey to the Standard Milk Sugar Company.

Mr. and Mrs. John Anand came in on Saturday and remained until Sunday. Mr. Anand is the manager of the Portland Commercial Club. He was greatly pleased with the city, and he had considerable to do with paving while councilman of Portland for six years.

An auto party arrived in the city on Sunday, composed of Sarah B. Farmer and P. E. Fullerton and wife, of Salem, and Mrs. J. D. Riley, Ruth and Harold Riley and Mrs. J. L. Stockbridge, of Portland. The party had come from Camp Joy, at Neskowin, and called themselves "The Bunch."

Arrangements have been completed for the entertainment of the Moose excursion to this city on Saturday, when it is expected that the excursionists will number one thousand. There will be a dance at the opera house that night, and on Sunday two ball games, with a clam lunch served near the depot.

As it is not generally known that the passenger train leaving this city at 3:45 p.m. carries mail, for the information of the public we wish to state that there is no mail coach on the train, but a through pouch is made up in this city for Portland. To catch this train letters must be mailed not later than 3:15 in the post-office.

Arthur J. Stillwell and A. A. Pennington having dissolved partnership in the firm of Mason-Pennington & Co., Mr. Stillwell has taken over the Ladies' Department and is moving the goods to the store opposite, which will be temporary quarters, as he will have an up-to-date store and stock of goods in the Oddfellows' building. Mr. Pennington has taken the gents' goods and will remain in the present quarters.

County Clerk Holden paid out \$1971.00 for moles and gophers up to this morning. Mrs. J. J. Hoielt brought in 322 from Blaine this week. The County Court is undecided as to the amount of money it can pay out this year for these bounties, as the law is somewhat confusing, while on the other hand, it is thought best to exterminate as many as possible at this time, which would prevent them from increasing.

An unfortunate affair took place on Thursday evening over the pavement controversy, all of which adds to the bad reputation of the city. L. H. McMahon, a night watchman for the Warren Construction Company, and better known as big Mac, knocked Ex-Senator C. W. Fulton down when inspecting the pavement that evening after some uncomplimentary words had passed between the two men.

E. C. Clement, post office inspector, came in on Wednesday for the purpose of appointing several postmasters in this county. He appointed new postmasters at Rector and Lake Lytle, and filled a vacancy at Blaine today. A postoffice is also to be established at Manhattan. It is the duty of the post office inspector to appoint postmasters where the receipts are under a certain amount.

Mrs. J. C. Holden has resigned her position as manager of the telephone office in this city, and Byron Klock has taken her place. Mrs. Holden has been in charge of the office for seven years and she has given general satisfaction, being exceedingly accommodating and obliging to the public. Mr. Klock has been made manager and wire chief, and Miss Ruby Anderson chief operator.

The injunction suit brought by a number of citizens to restrain the city from assessing the property for street pavements, constructed by the Warren Construction Co., is still being heard before Judge Campbell, with the prospect that it will take another week or more before the case is through. A good deal of the time of the court has been taken up by "muckraker" questions put to the witnesses by the attorneys.

The Ladies' Committee of the Tillamook Commercial Club is arranging for a novel entertainment at the club rooms next Thursday evening, when Miss Lottie Banfield will render a drama "The Melting Pot," and give several musical pieces. The drama takes 1 1/2 hours, and Miss Banfield has won great praise in rendering it at private and other parties in Portland. The proceeds of the entertainment will be used for the benefit of the club.

W. W. Kerns, son-in-law of Johan Poulsen, of Portland, has been spending his vacation at Bayocean. Mr. Kerns is one of the proprietors

of the largest printing plants in Portland. He is occupying the Poulsen cottage, and Mr. Poulsen is building two more cottages, making an investment of \$30,000 in Bayocean. Mr. Kerns thinks that with so much money invested at Bayocean and the large amount of taxes paid, it is not treating Bayocean right to deprive it of a road.

During the quarter ending June 30, 1913, the State Engineer issued three permits for the appropriation of water in Tillamook County. R. O. Richards, of Beaver, secured two permits to appropriate water from Folland Creek and an unnamed spring. The water is to be diverted in Sections 20 and 32, Township 3 South, Range 7 West for the irrigation of 83 acres of land, including domestic use. Solon Schiffman, of Bay City, also secured a permit to appropriate the waters of Doughty Creek to supply a part of Bay City and also for domestic use.

Wm. C. O'Hara died at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. H. H. Brown, 231 Shaver st., Portland, June 21, 1913. He came to Oregon by the Isthmus of Panama route. He was born in county Sligo, Ireland, in 1832. His business kept him in Portland until 1883, when he took up farming in Netarts, Tillamook Co., Ore., where he was postmaster for twenty years. He returned to Portland four years ago and since that time has lived with his daughter. He leaves four daughters and two sons. Mrs. W. Johnson, Mrs. H. H. Brown, Mrs. C. M. Martin, Mrs. C. F. Groce, Mr. Wm. O'Hara, all of Portland. Bat O'Hara, of Netarts. The funeral took place on June 23, from St. Mary's Church, when requiem high mass was held.

H. A. Youmans vs. the Pacific Railway & Navigation Co. is a suit filed in the Circuit Court in which the plaintiff claims damages to the amount of \$5,765. Plaintiff claims damages by reason of purchasing a passenger ticket for transportation from Tillamook to Hillsboro, and on December 20th, 1912, offered himself for transportation at Tillamook, where he was received as a passenger, and was in the train which was wrecked near the Roy place by a landslide. Plaintiff claims this was caused by the defendants carelessly, improperly, unskillfully and negligently constructed and maintained its road bed and right of way. By reason of the shock he claims to have been violently harried and thrust against the seats which caused him to suffer nervous disorders and mental anguish, for which he wants \$5,000 damages. For his clothes being damaged \$65 and \$700 on account of his trunks being detained 35 days.

Appointment of a county sealer of weights and measures is another duty facing the county court, according to a new bill passed by the 1913 legislature and which is now effective. The new law provides for a state sealer of weights and measures and authorizes the appointment of a state deputy. In addition, it is provided that the county court of every county shall appoint a county sealer whose duty it shall be to "visit at least once each year during his term of office every place of business where any scale, weight or measure, or any device for ascertaining the quantity of any commodity is kept for the purpose of trade, and try, test or prove such scale, weight or measure, or such device . . . and where they are found to be accurate shall seal the same with the seal to be kept by him for that purpose, and when found to be inaccurate shall condemn the same and mark with a tag forbidding the further use thereof until made to comply with the county standards." It is also made the duty of the county sealer of weights and measures to institute criminal proceedings against any persons whom he discovers in violation of the law regarding weights and measures.

County Fair Notes.

The Board of Directors of the Tillamook County Fair Association met in the Commercial Club rooms last Saturday.

The chairman of the Premium committee, W. C. King, reported that after carefully going over the list with the Board, the following changes were made:

Instead of three prizes for cheese \$25, \$15 and \$10, it was changed to five prizes, as follows: \$20 first, \$12.50 second; \$10 third; \$5 fourth; and \$2.50 fifth. To be added to this an entrance fee of \$1 for each contestant, this fee to be divided according to the prizes.

There were a few minor charges made, which will appear soon in the premium list published in a pamphlet.

Dr. J. E. Reedy, who is the official veterinarian in this county, was elected superintendent of live stock during the fair.

H. Booth was elected superintendent of poultry.

W. C. King was elected superintendent of vegetables, fruits and flowers.

Mrs. Webster Holmes was chosen to superintend Domestic Science and Art.

F. W. Christensen was chosen to superintend the milk test and cheese.

Will Spalding, who was appointed to see about grounds and buildings to hold the fair, reported. His report was accepted. The Board decided to hold the fair on the vacant lots back of the old Snuffer building, which was offered to them for use free of charge by W. G. Dwight. It was decided to order three large tents to hold the fair in.

Chas. Kunze and Wm. Maxwell were appointed in connection with Mr. Spalding as a building committee.

We wish to say that it is the desire of the board that each person elected to look after a department will do so, and help make the fair a success. To the people in the county I wish to say as secretary of the Board that you have a Board of managers that is going to do the best they can for the good of the County. It is new to most of us and we may make some mistakes, but I assure you, you will get an honest, fair and square deal. We do not expect to please everybody but expect to do the best we can for the good of our country. If you are a booster, get in and help and show what you can grow on your farm. It commends your county and you are a citizen of the county.
