P. S. Bromby, representing the Blodgett Co., came in on Saturday to look after the timber interests of the company. Mr. Bromby does not think it right that part of the timber in the Tillamook water shed should be taxed for harbor improvements and the other part exempt.

The Commissioners of the Port of Bay City are in receipt of telegraphic communications from the First National Bank of Cleveland, O., which has purchased the \$407,000 bond issue of the Port of Bay City, saying that the money had been deposited to the credit of the Government for use in the harbor improvements on Tillamook Bay.

The new hotel, which will be known as Hotel Tillamook, opened for business last week, with Charles Weiside as manager. The hotel is not quite finished, but by the 1st August it is expected that everything will be in first class shape for business. Quite a number of visitors have taken rooms at the hotel.

The law which provides a bounty of 25c. for moles and gophers in Tillamook county is doing a great deal to exterminate them. The amount of warrants drawn up to this morning was \$2,582.75, and with a number of moles sent in by parcel post will raise the amount to \$2,600. This makes about 12,800 of moles and gophers exterminated since the law went into effect.

In order to protect the seeds of the Douglas Fir that is to be planted during this summer, a campaign of extermination will be waged against field mice and other rodents in the burned over sections of Tillamook County, and poisoned grain will be liberally scattered over a tract of about 2,000 acres to be reforested. As soon as the poison crew finishes its work, a force of men will be sent to do the seeding, a task which will require about three months. In addition to the 2,000 acres to be seeded, an additional 1,000 acres will be planted with young trees.

A large number of citizens turned out on Saturday evening to witness the arrival of the excursion train from Portland with about 250 excursionists belonging to the Moose lodge of that city. ### Big Circus Coming.
