### BOUNTY IN STOPPED.

#### Moles and Gophers Felt Safe After To-Day.

The County Court made an order that the County Clerk was not to issue any more warrants for mole and gopher scalps, on account of lack of funds after to-day (Thursday).

The amount of money paid out was \$3,663.25 up to this (Thursday) morning, which paid for the extermination of 14,653 moles and gophers, nine-tenths of which were gophers. Since the law went into effect it has kept the Clerk's office busy, and it was necessary to have the furnace going to burn them as they came in, for some of those sent in by parcel post had begun to putrify and fill the atmosphere with obnoxious, unsanitary fumes.

### County Fair Notes.

Any one who aims to exhibit cattle at the Fair please let us know at once so we can notify the state veterinarian and he will have your cattle tested for tuberculosis and give you a certificate of health for the animal. This examination will not cost the owner anything, and is in accordance with the law passed in 1913. No entry for exhibit will be accepted until such certificate of health is filed with the secretary. Do not neglect this.

Now is the time to prepare your grasses for the fair. We hope every farmer will get a bunch of grass, clover and oats. Give us a few choice specimens from each class. Quality rather than quantity is what we want.

A few suggestions as to gathering and preparing for exhibit:

1. Gather before too ripe, they will shatter if you do not.
  2. Select large well filled heads.
- In preparing, first, strip the straws clean of all blades; 2nd, arrange plumb at the heads and cut off the straws ends squarely, tie near the heads, in the middle and at the straw end. Each bunch should be three inches in diameter. We hope every farmer will get a few nice bunches and send in.

### The Hadley Case.

The Hadley case went to trial before Circuit Judge J. W. Campbell this week. This is a case where Mrs. Otelia Hadley had sued C. E. Hadley for her interest in the estate of C. B. Hadley. She claimed that a partnership existed between her husband and C. E. Hadley. After the suit was filed the case was settled out of court, C. E. Hadley paying Otelia Hadley \$7,000, which was done without consulting her attorney, Oak Nolan, who opposed a motion to dismiss the case for the reason that his attorney's fees, which he placed at \$25,000, had not been paid. When the case came before Judge Galloway he stipulated that Nolan should pay the \$7,000 into court to show good faith. Nolan had not done this and Judge Campbell allowed the case to go to trial. Some surprise was caused when a deposition was read which Nolan admitted on the stand that he had prepared in his office at Portland and went to California and compelled Mrs. Hadley to sign it. The deposition covered a good deal of the private and business affairs of the Hadleys. Judge Campbell would not allow this to go in as evidence. In his reply Attorney Nolan had alleged that C. E. Hadley had agreed to divorce his wife and marry Mrs. Otelia Hadley, provided she would agree to settle the case for \$7,000. Attorney Nolan produced a number of deeds, but thus far he has failed to show that a partnership existed between C. B. Hadley and C. E. Hadley.
