### Buy at Home.

Your editorials, "Buy at Home," are timely, and should be heeded by every good citizen. The prosperity of every Oregonian depends on this, and the appeal of the Retail Merchants' Association to our citizens to "Keep Oregon money in Oregon" is quite right. First of all, however, a campaign should be started among the members of the Retail Merchants' Association so that they also will pledge themselves to buy at home and not send away for things that are produced in Oregon just as good and better, just as cheap and cheaper, than they can be produced elsewhere. This rule needs to work both ways. It should not be, Buy jewelry at home, or dry goods at home, or clothing and shoes at home, and when you want breakfast foods, or cheese, or printing, or life insurance, and so on all along the line, then take whatever you happen to have offered to you. The Oregon product from an Oregon firm should be the rule for every Oregonian. The trouble with this "Buy at Home" proposition is that frequently the man urging it is simply thinking of himself and not of the masses. Take, for instance, architects, who make it a rule to specify in their plans that brick made in Washington should be used in a building that is to be put up in Portland. And right here I might say that the public buildings of Portland that have been erected the last year or two are nothing to be proud of, when it is considered that the material was brought from elsewhere, when better and handsomer material can be had right at our doors. Or, take some of the contractors of some of the big structures. They buy only what they must buy here, and send away for everything that they can possibly send away for, impoverishing Oregon as much as they possibly can. What we need is more civic pride and loyalty to our own institutions, and all the rest will regulate itself. We should take lessons from the state to the north of us and from either one of these states, the outside contractor stand a mighty poor show, unless the price is very much lower, and it should be so in Oregon.
