A boat was launched and the captain picked up by the other two men, when they made shore south of the cape, the fishing boat being destroyed, which was worth about \$5,000. The men made their way to Hemlock where C. J. Crook kept them overnight and brought them to this city, when they took the train to Portland. They would all have been drowned had it not been for the small boat.

On Thursday evening, Mrs. Edyth Foxier Weathered, who represents the Oregon Manufacturers' Association, addressed a small meeting of

business men on the subject of fostering home industries and patronizing home industries, at the Commercial Club. Mrs. Weathered is on a campaign of education, showing the crying need of patronizing "Oregon made" goods and creating more pay rolls. She showed what a large amount of money was sent to Eastern states for merchandise and products which should be made and produced in Oregon. Washington and California women were doing a great deal for their states in purchasing goods and produce raised there, and the women of Oregon should do the same, for they spend about 90 per cent of the money in goods. She referred to the large amount of clothing and blankets which were made in Eastern States manufactured from Oregon wool which if manufactured in this state would mean more prosperity. Mrs. Weathered said the association helped financially small industries in making a start, and in this way they hoped to create more pay rolls.

Drowned at Barview.

While bathing at Barview on Wednesday evening, Lloyd Hardman was taken out by the tide and was drowned. He was from Portland and about 30 years of age. The body was recovered and Coroner Hawk held an inquest on the remains. A verdict of accidental drowning was returned.
