Watch the dairymen come to town next week and see them pack off the prizes.

Patronize home industry—attend the first fair given by the Tillamook County Fair Association.

More bad news about fighting the street pavement. The high priced attorneys are wanting some pay from those who were milked for 10 per cent.

We understand that there is to be a novel stunt at the fair next week, when pretty Swiss dairy maids will climb the Alps. Now's your chance, boys.

Everybody in Tillamook City ought to wear a broad smile, for visitors are praising the paved streets, fine buildings and general appearance of the city. Certainly it is pleasing to hear this after hearing the wail of the curb stone knockers for six months.

In this neck of the woods we read of excessive heat and crop failures in other parts of the country. What a contrast in Tillamook, where the atmosphere is cool, crop failures are unknown, and the whole county covered with a green verdure, resembling early spring. Tillamookers are certainly blessed and should be thankful that they live in such a cool, productive country when Old Sol is getting in his work in other sections, scorching up all kinds of vegetation and making it tropical for humanity to bear.

"All Aboard for Nehalem on Saturday." It is the annual Industrial Fair and Floral Show at that place and the Nehalemites offer the glad hand to the citizens to visit them that day. Other sections of the county which have neglected the local displays should see what interest and pride the people of Nehalem take in them. And by way of encouragement and to help boost the Nehalem fair, we hope as many as possible will attend, and we feel confident that those who do so will have a delightful time and will be delighted with the fair.

It is surprising, of the large number of visitors to Tillamook City this year, how many were here for the first time. And they, too, were surprised to find such a progressive city and a splendid dairy and timbered county. Visitors seem to have had an impression that the city was right close to the ocean and a kind of a summer resort, and when they find a clean, up-to-date city, with paved streets, substantial buildings, doing a large volume of business in the center of the best dairying section of Oregon, no wonder that they are surprised and predict that Tillamook has a bright future and will rank with the large towns of Oregon in a few years.

It used to be that a few Tillamookers and a few campers had a monopoly of the beaches in this county. It is estimated that there are between 1,500 to 2,000 visitors on Garibaldi beach every day. Considering that it is but a start, it will be only a few years before there are from 10,000 to 12,000 visitors daily at

our beaches. What will help bring this about is good roads so that visitors can go in autos from one beach to the other. See what a large amount of travel have gone over the road to Netarts this year as the result of a good road. And for that reason we intend to boost for better roads to all our beach resorts, for a large amount of money is going to be invested in buildings.

The snap shot man is not going to be uncharitable in criticising the Rev. H. W. Kuhlman, of the M. E. church, other than to say that he used exceedingly poor judgment in the way he acted in Portland last week and he can only blame himself for the criticism and notoriety on account of his own indiscretion. He judged a respectable woman to be a woman of the under world, and this is where he erred and forgot one of the precepts of the good old book, "Judge not, that he be not judged." Although the white slave traffic is deplorable we hope the rev. gentleman will use a little more Christian charity and not imagine that every woman he meets late at night is leading the life of a prostitute. Wednesday, Thursday and Friday next will be the first annual fair given by the Tillamook County Fair Association, which was organized in the interest of the dairying and agricultural industry of the county. One pleasing feature of the fair is the fact that it is to be a home industry exhibition and not a fakir's carnival, with the management in the hands of those connected with farming. So we feel convinced that it is going to be the best fair ever held in the county and that the Fair Association is going to bring about good results. The Board of Directors should be commended for the energy devoted to make it a success, and we believe the praise will be general after the fair and it will help to stimulate a greater interest in a bigger and better fair next year. Considering the short time to arrange it, and the small amount of money the directors had at their disposal, we believe it will be a howling success from start to finish with a get together spirit to boost for Tillamook products. Should anything about the fair not come up to our expectations, boost the fair, anyway, and speak a kind word for those who have labored hard and faithfully to make a success of it.

Just consider for a few moments the amount of money that is sent out of Oregon for produce and merchandise manufactured in other states. That explains the reason why Oregon is not making the progress it should in industrial growth and obtaining payrolls, which is necessary to support a large population. Take for instance all the stores in Tillamook and it is surprising what few articles are manufactured or produced in Oregon. Mrs. Weathered, who represents the Manufacturers' Association, was in the city last week on a campaign of education, with the idea of creating a sentiment in favor of the encouragement and maintenance of legitimate Oregon industries, patronage of products, supplies, manufactured articles, institutions and enterprises that have to do with the pay rolls of Oregon. "Made in Oregon" is going to be a slogan for Oregonians, and every person who has the welfare of the State at heart must become interested, for the States of Washington and California have organized and the people there are enthusiastic and loyal. It is up to the people of Oregon to do likewise, otherwise this State will lag behind for want of industries and payrolls. Everybody get into the habit of purchasing "Made in Oregon" products—ask for them and boost for them.

The Cornelius Tribune was kind to the snap shot man last week, not that we are looking for or desirous of bouquets, for in our newspaper experience we find opinion so much divided that one person will commend an editorial article while another person will get hot in the

amount because the editor published it. This is how the Tribune compliments the snap shot man:

A GOOD JOURNALIST.
 Editor F. C. Baker, of the Tillamook Headlight, has spoken very nicely of the New Tribune, and what he has said is reprinted this week—the theory being that when others are kind enough to toot one's horn, he should at least help them along.
 But aside from that, we want to say that we admire Mr. Baker as a country journalist. We think that Mr. Baker's example is one that any journalist may safely follow. If he do so, even though his name is not heralded abroad, and his paper be not known beyond the confines of a county, or several counties at the most, yet that editor and that journal has been a success—just that without any qualifications—a success.
 Without any pretensions, Mr. Baker's Headlight has moved serenely onward through many years, weathering many a gale of unpopularity and many a storm of adverse criticism, but yet moving always onward, still the same.
 Week in and week out it has carried its freight of news and opinion, in proper proportions, in qualities that have seldom varied.
 Mr. Baker has been in many a hard fight often on the unpopular side, but has never shown his heels. Whatever one may think of the personal opinion of such a man, he must admire his perseverance and courage.
 We have frequently disagreed with Mr. Baker, in our private opinion. At other times we have agreed with him. But any editor that can follow in the path of Mr. Baker is a good editor.

NEW ASSESSMENT LAW.
Some Important Changes Which Are of Interest.
 We give below some of the most important changes in the new assessment law, which should interest property owners.
 Section 2. That Section 3586 of Lord's Oregon Laws shall be and hereby amended to read as follows:
 Sec. 3586. Assessments, how made.
 The assessor after qualifying shall, on or before the first Monday in March in each year, procure for the county a blank assessment roll, and forthwith proceed and assess all taxable property within his county, except such as by law is to be assessed elsewhere. Before the second Monday in September next following the assessor shall enter in such assessment roll a full and complete assessment of such taxable property, including a full and precise description of the lands and lots owned by each person therein named, on March 1st of said year, at the expiration of one o'clock a.m., which description shall correspond with the plan or plat of any town laid out or recorded; and said lands and town lots shall be valued at their true cash value, taking into consideration the improvements on the land and in the surrounding country, and any rights or privileges attached thereto or connected therewith, the quality of the soil, and the natural resources in, on, or connected with the land, its convenience to transportation lines, public roads and other local advantages of a similar or different kind. Cultivated and uncultivated land of the same character and quality, and similarly situated, shall be assessed at the same value. True cash value of property shall be held and taken to mean the amount such property would sell for at a voluntary sale made in the ordinary course of business, taking into consideration its earning power and such other factors as may be applicable for determining such value. No deduction of indebtedness from assessments or taxation shall be allowed in any case.
 Sec. 3587. Owner to furnish lists and value, penalty for refusal.
 Every assessor shall require any person liable to be taxed in his county and to be assessed by him, to furnish such assessor:
 1. A list of all the real estate of such person, firm, corporation or association having any interest, situate in his county, liable to taxation; which list shall include a statement to be made by such person, managing agent or officer, showing the true cash value of every parcel of such real estate, or interest therein, owned by such person, firm, corporation or association.
 2. A list of all the personal property of such person, firm, corporation or association liable to taxation in his county; which list shall include a statement to be made by such person, managing agent or officer, showing the true cash value of such personal property, or of the several items thereof, owned by such person, firm, corporation or association, or in which such person, firm, corporation or association has any interest.
 The assessor shall require such person, managing agent or officer to make oath that, to the best of his knowledge and belief, such list, whether of real or of personal property, or both, contains a full and true account of all the real or personal property, or both, or of any interest therein, of such person, firm, corporation or association, liable to be taxed in said county, and the true cash value of such real or personal property, or both, and of the several parcels or items thereof, should any such person, managing agent or officer, when so required, refuse to furnish such a list of real or of personal property, with the true cash value or values thereof, or to swear to the same when required so to do by the assessor, such person, managing agent or officer shall forfeit and pay to the assessor, for the use of the county, the sum of \$100 which sum may be recovered by action in any court having jurisdiction of matters of debt or contract to the

amount of \$100. Should any such person, managing agent or officer, when so required, refuse to furnish and to swear to any such list, the assessor shall ascertain the taxable property of such person, firm, corporation or association, and shall appraise the same from the best information to be derived from other sources. Upon the failure of any such person, managing agent or officer to make such valuation or valuations, the assessor shall be deemed to be the authorized agent of such person, firm, corporation or association for the purpose of making said valuation or valuations, and the same, as given in the assessment roll, shall have the same force and effect as if made under oath by said person, managing agent or officer. The assessor may increase any valuation made by such person, managing agent or officer for purposes of assessment and taxation.

Sec. 3661. County Court to estimate and apportion tax.—The county court of each county shall, at its term in December in each year, estimate the amount of money to be raised in its county for county purposes, and apportion such amount, together with the amount of state and school tax, and other taxes required by law to be raised in its county, and such other taxes as it may in its discretion as authorized by law determine shall be raised, according to the valuation of the taxable property in the county for the year, and such determination shall be entered in its records.
 Sec. 3662. County Court to levy tax for county purposes.—For the purpose of raising revenues for county purposes, the county court for each county in the state shall, in its December term in each year, levy a tax upon all taxable property in its county, which tax shall be sufficient in its amount to defray the expenses of the county.
 Sec. 3663. Same for other purposes.—The county court shall, at its December term in each year, levy any other taxes which by law the county court or board of county commissioners is required to levy, and any other taxes which it may determine to levy and which by law it is permitted to levy.
 Sec. 3664. Corporation authorized to levy tax to notify clerk and assessor of levy.—It shall be the duty of every school district, and each incorporated town and city, and of each public corporation authorized to levy a tax, to notify, in writing, the county clerk and the county assessor of the county within which the school district, town, city or public corporation is situated, of the rate per cent of the tax levy made by it, on or before the first day of December in each year, which notices shall be kept on file by the several county clerks and county assessors, and remain a part of the records of their respective offices.
 Sec. 3665. County Treasurer to be tax collector.—Except as otherwise provided by law, the county treasurer of each county shall be the tax collector thereof.
